LOCAL COMMITTEE OF THE BELGIAN HOME, SWINDON.

The Accounts of the Treasurer of the Parochial Fund (the Vicar) were audited on March 26th, 1915, by Mr. J. H. Wilson, and showed that from Dec. 31st, 1914, to Feb. 28th, 1915, the sum of £17 14 11 had been voluntarily weekly instalments to the Fund. Out of this sum £13 16 0 had been paid towards the expenses of the "Belgian Home" of St. Chilton St., Swindon, leaving a balance of £3 18 11. Of this amount £2 2 0 has been spent in the purchase of material for the parochial Red Cross working party, and £1 has been for the two "partisans of war" from the parish, having a balance of £1 16 11 in the Treasurer's hands. The "Home" is quite self-sufficing so that the men and women accommodated in it would be made of Belgian soldiers who are seeking shelter and hospitality in our country. We shall all be willing to contribute our help, so long as the need is in them.
