

Kellys Directory Extract 1867 Allington



Allington (near Amesbury) is a parish and village in the Southern division of the county, Amesbury hundred and union, Salisbury county court district, diocese, and archdeaconry, and Amesbury rural deanery, 4 miles east-southeast from Amesbury, 8½ north-east from Salisbury, and 2½ from Porton station. The church has been rebuilt, and was consecrated in 1851; it is a small edifice, with square tower and 3 bells, and comprises a chancel and nave, embracing the Norman, Early English, and Perpendicular styles of architecture. The register dates from 1655. The living is a rectory, yearly value £236, in the gift of Lord Craven, and held by the Rev. Fulwar William Fowle, M.A., of Merton College, Oxford, rural dean, prebendary of Sarum, and perpetual curate of Amesbury; the Rev. Francis Howson, M.A., of Lincoln College, O:xford, is the curate. Here is a small Primitive Methodist chapel. J. H. C. Wyndham, Esq., is Lord of the manor. The principal landowners are James Horne Esq., and the Amesbury Charity. The crops are wheat, barley, and oats. The area is 936 acres, and the population in 1861 was 93.
