1866

William Day will in future train exclusively for Lord Durham and Sir Frederick Johnstone, and the other horses now in training at Woodyates are to be transferred to his son, who will commence training at Alvediston.

1867

Lady Elizabeth:- This filly, who scored her tenth successive victory on Friday, has up to the present time won for her noble owner, in stakes alone, nearly £7,000.

Lady Elizabeth was bred by Sam Rogers, at Newmarket, and he sold her to Lord Hastings for 700 sovs, receiving at the same time a similar sum for her dam, Miss Bowzer, who was bred at Alvediston, in 1856, by William Day, and parted with to Sam Rogers for a comparatively small sum.

1874

A company has been formed, with the title of the West of England Stud Company, and a capital of £10,000 in £20 shares, for the purpose of carrying on the business of breeding thorough-bred horses and cart and other horses. The company have purchased part of the stud of Mr Wm Day, of Alvediston, Wilts.
