
ATWORTH

History

Atworth is a chapelry in the parish of Bradford on Avon in the county of Wiltshire. It is 3 miles N.W of Melksham, 3 miles S of Corsham and 5 miles N.E of Bradford. The modern day parish is bounded by South Wraxall to the West, Box and Corsham to the North, Melksham Without and Broughton Gifford to the East, and Holt to the South

Atworth village has existed for over a thousand years and was referred to by King Athelred II in a charter dated 1001 which granted permission to the Abess of Shaftesbury to build a chapel at Atworth. The building was completed about 1070, and also mentioned in the Domesday Book of 1086.

Atworth village was originally near St Michael's church and spread into three parts by the end of the 15th century – Attewarde Magna, Greater Atworth (Area by the Old Post Office), Mechel Attewarde, Middle Atworth (The Bradford Road area) and Attewarde Parva or Cottles Attewarde (Little Attworth, or the area of Cottles) In medieval times there were three manor houses of which **Cottles House** is the only one which exists now. Cottles House was built by Robert Cotel about 1102, and is now Stonar School which is a private school for girls. **The Manor of Atworth** which was possibly the forerunner of the present day Manor Farm. The other manor house originated in the estate of Agnes Bournton in 1431, but very little is known of its whereabouts or even its existence.



Village Name

There are a couple thoughts on how the village originally got its name. One thought is that it was named after a Saxon farmer called Aetta who lived there in the 13th century. Another version is that the 'At' in the name originates from oat which may have been abundant in the area, and 'Worth' means locality or homestead.

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Population

Trades

The occupations of villagers were mainly agricultural with the accompanying trades of blacksmith and reeve. There were also open quarries to the north of the village which would also have employed some of the villagers
