

## Post Office Directory Extract 1855 Atworth



**Atworth -** or Atford, a chapelry and tithing in the parish, Hundred and Union of Bradford, 5 miles north-east of Bradford, 3 south of Corsham station, 101 from London, 9 east of Bath, situated on the high road from London to Bath and Bristol. There are several quarries of excellent stone in the neighbourhood, well adapted for building purposes. The living is a perpetual curacy, value £250, in the diocese of Sarum, united to the adjoining chapelry of South Wraxall, and is now a distinct parish for ecclesiastical purposes, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol. The incumbent is the Rev. W. Laxton, M.A., who resides at Holt. The church, a neat structure of modern date, was rebuilt a few years since; the ancient square tower, containing 3 bells, once attached to the old building, now stands isolated to the north of the present erection. Mrs. Jane Brown, widow, in the year 1706 devised £10 yearly to the minister for catechizing children, and £5 for clothing the poor. Here is a small Independent chapel, a National and an Infant school. The population, in 1851, was 638. Lord Methuen is the lord of the manor.
