

Crime and Punishment

Baverstock

Committed to Fisherton Gaol

This particular gaol was built between 1818 & 1822 on the east side of the Devizes Road, Salisbury just beyond the junction with Wilton Road and was closed in 1870. The building was demolished from 1875 except for the central block and acquired by Dr William Corbin Finch, the proprietor of the Fisherton House Lunatic Asylum and named Radnor House.

Thring	James	Of Steeple Langford, along with Joseph Sparey, charged with having unlawfully entered into a piece of coppice at Baverstock, in company with other persons, armed with a gun and bludgeons, for the purpose of taking and destroying game. <i>Outcome:</i> Committed to Fisherton Gaol	Salisbury and Winchester Journal 27 December, 1845
Brown	George	Of Baverstock, charged with stealing a shirt, the property of John Cross. <i>Outcome:</i> Committed to Fisherton Gaol – 14 days Imprisonment	Salisbury and Winchester Journal 24 April, 1847
