## WILTS FRIENDLY SOCIETY

The sixteenth anniversary of this benevolent and really good society was celebrated on Thursday, the 11<sup>th</sup> inst., at Warminster. At about half-past eleven o'clock, the members (both honorary and benefit), to the number of nearly 500, proceeded from the Town-hall to the parish church, where Divine Service was performed by the Rev. Arthur Fane, after which an able and eloquent sermon was preached by the Ven. The Archdeacon of Sarum, from John ix. 4, "The night cometh when no man can work." Having forcible pointed out the temporal comforts and advantages held out by society, and given a detail of its objects and operations, the Ven. Archdeacon in the most impressive manner showed that the same diligence which is required to lay up a provision against the hour of sickness and infirmity during the season of health and strength, is equally needed to lay up treasure in Heaven, so that when our sojourn on earth is ended, we may be found to have worked during our day of grace, and when the night cometh in which no man can work, be admitted, through the merits of our Saviour, into everlasting habitations.

Soon after two o'clock, the whole of the members again assembled at the Town-hall, where a good dinner of old English fare, accompanied with plenty of strong beer, was provided. Mr Sotheron (the Honorary Secretary of the Society) was in the chair and devoted all his energies to promote the comfort and enjoyment of those around him. Among those who were present, were J. Ravenhill, Esq. (who officiated as Vice-president), the Ven. Archdeacon Lear, the Rev. A. Fane, Vicar of Warminster; the Hon. And Rev. W. A. Spencer, of Erchfont; the Rev. E. Eliot, of Norton Bavant; the Rev. H. Walsh, of Chalke; the Rev. George Stallard, of Warminster; the Rev. Chas. Arnold, Master of Lord Weymouth's School; the Rev. W. Gray, of Upton Lovell; the Rev. W. Dyer, of Imber; the Rev. \_ Thompson, of Upton Scudmore, the Rev. H. Wightwick of Codford; the Rev. E. Vincent, of Rowde; the Rev. W. T. Wylde, of Woodborough; the Rev. W. E. Hony, of Baverstock .....

In the evening the members partook of tea on the lawn of the Rectory-house, where they were joined by most of the families in the neighbourhood.
