Berwick St. Leonard

Berwick St. Leonard is a parish, in the Southern division of the county, Dunworth hundred, Tisbury union, Hindon petty sessional division, Shaftesbury county court division, Salisbury diocese and archdeaconry, and Chalke rural deanery, 15 miles west from Salisbury and one mile east from Hindon. The church of St. Leonard was restored in 1860, the entire cost being defrayed by Alfred Morrison, Esq., it is built of stone and the flint of the walls of the ancient fabric: it has a nave and chancel; and on the south side it has a tower, 25ft high, with 2 bells: there are some ancient monuments preserved; one to the How family bears date 1645. The register dates from 1723. The living is a rectory, with the perpetual curacy of Sedghill annexed, joint annual value £374, including 110 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Marquis of Westminster, and held by the Rev. Charles Henry Grove, M.A., of University College, Oxford: The Rev. Joseph Holden Johnson, B.A., of St. Catherine's College, Cambridge, is curate. Alfred Morrison, Esq., is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The soil is light chalky; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and pasturage. The area is 1,100 acres, and the population in 1861 was 60.
