
BOW TIES AND BELLES - A SUMMER SOIREE

GARDEN NOTES FOR AUGUST

Prune summer flowering shrubs, Wisteria and climbing and rambling roses that do not repeat flower. Dead-head flowering plants such as Roses, Dahlias and Penstemons to prolong the display. Collect seed from plants ready to sow next year and take pink and carnation cuttings, or propagate by layering. Tubs will need regular watering as they do not get very wet even if it rains. Feed plants in containers and possibly some in borders. Towards the end of August, sow hardy annuals direct into the beds to overwinter and flower next year.

Plant out rooted Strawberry runners. Check tomato and potato plants for blight and if found, dispose of plants appropriately. Beware of carrot root fly - a bit of fleece over the plants will help to keep the fly off. Harvest vegetables regularly to enjoy at their best. This is the last chance to sow quick maturing salad crops. Enjoy the fruits of your labours. Wildlife still requires water and food! Look out for Mrs Tiggywinkle and her young. They will be around soon.

BROADBAND IN BREMHILL PARISH

Gigabit broadband is coming to Bremhill Parish. Wiltshire Council have signed a contract with Gigaclear to provide Full Fibre in Bremhill Parish. You can go to https://www.gigaclear.com/wiltshireonline and check the status for your property. The building of their network will take place at some time between late 2017 and the end of 2019 and the roll-out schedule is expected to be published on the link just given by the end of July.

Gigaclear is a company targeting building Full Fibre networks in rural locations like ours. The company is located near Oxford and is growing rapidly, including a very large contract for parts of Devon and Somerset. Gigaclear provide Full Fibre connections, so your distance and location is not important. The connection speed you pay for is the speed you will get and, for most people, a 50Mb or 100Mb will be all they need, but if you really want the full 1000Mb speed, that is available too. This should be seen as a positive improvement to this locality by a growing company which has a good track record with very few complaints that I could find.

JOHN L.HARRIS- DIP AD, MSIA Artist, Spirthill

When I paint an image of the land or the sea I am actually creating an experience of light and therein lies a paradox...light is invisible, but makes things visible. In the natural world, light creates the colour. In the making of a painting, colour creates the light. Through the seasons, natural daylight is infinitely changing and has an impact on the distance we see, the length and intensity of shadows that model the landscape and the amount of reflective light that gives an appearance of movement and sparkle in the ocean. This in turn denotes the range of colours, hues and tones that are observed to form an opinion on how atmospheric the scene is, and finally, whether you emotionally connect with it.

Natural light is a beacon for the human spirit!

Here lies the challenge for me as an artist who paints landscapes and seascapes. I explore this emotional potential in a moment in time that connects through the natural world of weather moods and light plays on the land and water. I have a

fascination with the seasons and how they affect the land and with the sea, wind and tides.

My work is created predominately in watercolour or acrylics which have techniques very different to each other when creating the illusion of light in my paintings.



Watercolour requires a more planned approach as it is the luminosity of the white paper that is left unpainted to shine through and create highlights. I use acrylics in the same manner as opaque oil paint which means I build up the layers of colours from dark to light finally putting in the lightest colours or whites with thick impasto paint, a process which is virtually the reverse of watercolour. I get emotionally charged when I see an inky sky with a bright patch of light illuminating a field, the sea, or a tree contrasting against a dark horizon. I love the whole craft of the painting process from observation, to sketching, to the final statement.

I trained as a graphic designer and art director which involved artificial light effects in photography, TV filming and the direction of award ceremonies including The Booker Prize for Excellence. However, I have always painted and it is the continual connection to natural light that has spiritual resonance for me and keeps me painting - the way sunlight through the leaves on trees dapples the ground with patterned light, how it reflects in patches of light in a brook or the open sea and its power to create a mood and atmosphere in a dramatic sky that simply takes your breath away.

SWISS ROLL RECIPE

(For Bremhill Produce Show maybe?)

This recipe has been taken from my school exercise book - I wrote it for my homework in about 1966! It is very detailed, and makes quite amusing reading. You will have to change the weights and oven temperature into metric if you wish!

- 2 eggs
- 2 oz self-raising flour
- 3 oz caster sugar
- If chocolate flavoured, replace ½ ounce flour with cocoa

Put the oven on at Mark 6 (425F). Grease a Swiss roll tin and put in greaseproof paper, slit the paper for about 1 inch in the corners, so that the Swiss roll will have square corners. Brush the greaseproof paper - sides, corners and bottom - with lard or cooking fat (for best results).

Break the eggs into a bowl and whisk slightly. Add the sugar (caster sugar is used because it is finer than granulated, so it mixes better). Whisk, standing the bowl over a saucepan of hot water - it introduces air and so makes the sponge light. Carry on mixing until it goes thick and paler in colour (fresh eggs are best because they whisk well because they have a lot of egg white). Take the hot water away and whisk until cool. The whisking is important because it makes the sponge light. Sift the flour and fold it in a little at a time with a metal spoon (do this gently so as not to let too much air out). If making chocolate Swiss roll, the flour and the cocoa should be sifted together several times previously to mix them and get rid of any streaks. When the flour has been folded in, the mixture should be a pourable consistency. Pour it into the tin, tilt the tin to let the mixture spread evenly. Put in the oven to cook for about 8 minutes. If it is cooked for too long, it goes crisp and won't roll properly. Have a piece of greaseproof paper ready, sprinkled with caster sugar, so the Swiss roll won't stick. If filling with jam and buttercream, spread the jam on now, then roll it up with another piece of greaseproof paper on the inside. To help start rolling the Swiss roll (which should be pliable) make a slight indentation about ¼ inch from the end. Roll from there. Make the butter icing and when quite cool, unroll the Swiss roll and spread it on.

BREMHILL SHOW - PAPIER MACHÉ ITEM

his can be made around a balloon of any shape. Or a plastic bowl can be used. Cover the bowl with cling film before putting on the papier maché. Materials:

- Wallpaper paste and /or PVA white glue;
- Old ice cream tub or similar for the paste/glue mixture;
- Newspaper (or other absorbent paper) torn into squares approx. 5x5cm;
- Balloon or plastic bowl or plastic container from the supermarket which had fruit or vegetables sold in it or other similar object;
- Paint brush and paint.

Make up the wallpaper paste as instructed on the packet. It should be the consistency of double cream! Add one part of PVA glue to 6 parts of wallpaper paste. It should look cloudy; OR Just use PVA glue. 2 parts of glue to one part of water. Use the old ice-cream tub for the paste /glue. Then:

- Soak the squares of newspaper in the paste/glue;
- Put the balloon or bowl on a bucket so it is off the surface;
- Cover the object that you are using with the paste/glue squares;
- Smooth the paper. This bit is gloriously messy.
- Leave to dry for about a day and then put on another layer. In total you need at least three layers, maybe more.
- Leave to dry completely.
- Paint the paper and trim the edges.

Use your imagination and make it into some sort of arty item or you could go to Google and search for further ideas and instructions.

TALLEST WEED - PLEASE NOTE

Some 'weed' plants are poisonous, others can cause rashes or blisters on the skin such as Giant Hog Weed (looks like large cow parsley). So when the children go out to look for a tall weed they should have an adult with them. Although the children will be selecting their weed adults will need to make sure they avoid dangerous plants - better to avoid plants you don't recognise.

NATURE MATTERS

Press reports have highlighted the plight of bees, particularly bumble bees which have declined in numbers by 60% since 1970, with some species becoming extinct. Bees are critical for our well-being because of their importance in the pollination of fruit and crops, and therefore I give some suggestions of things people can do to encourage bees into their garden. This mainly involves providing the bees with food (nectar) and nesting sites.

To maximise food for bees, provide plants that flower at different times of the year providing nectar from mid-March to late-September. Grow good-sized patches of each plant as groups of flowers are a better attractant than individual plants. Try to incorporate traditional native wildflowers and cottage garden flowers. Trees and shrubs such as willow, cherry and Prunus species are excellent as they provide lots of early flowers, whilst buddleia is also great for insects including bees. Flowers that sway on longer stems attract a greater variety of pollinators than static blooms. Plants such as snapdragon, foxglove, bell-flower, aubretia, hollyhock and mullein are all good for bees, and lavender seems to be the perfect bee attractant. Herbs also provide an excellent food source for bees, so grow herbs such as fennel, chive, lemon balm, mint, rosemary, and thyme.

If you have a bit of land to spare you could leave an area of grass/lawn un-mown to provide flowers, especially clover, during the summer. You could maintain an area of permanently taller grass alongside a hedge where there is a good chance that voles/mice may nest as old holes provide the perfect sites for bees to nest in. You can provide starter nests by putting a tennis ball-size lump of dry moss (or any natural plant fibre) at edge of a hedge or under flower pots which have been propped up to allow bees to get in. You can buy bee nesting boxes which you can hang up on fences. Alternatively you could make your own by taking an old piece of timber and drilling lots of holes (5-8mm diameter), angled slightly upwards to prevent water from collecting in them, and then dig the post into the ground or attach it to a fence post in a sunny position. The more potential nest sites the better the chance that bees will use them.

Bee nesting boxes can be purchased from many websites (just put bee nest box into Google) or try websites such as RSPB or NHBS.

We have a cuddle and I take her gifts of rice etc. into her hut. The Sri Lankans found this amusing and gave her the title 'Mother in Law'.

THE SKY AT NIGHT - JUNE 2017

The month of August has so many celestial treats I don't know where to start!

On the 7th August the moon will be located on the opposite side of the earth to the sun, and it's fully illuminated face will put on a dazzling full moon, also known as the full grain moon. Towards the end of the month we will have a new moon on the 21st.

On the 11th and 12th of August we will witness what is without doubt the best meteor shower of the year. At its peak, The Perseids Meteor shower can produce up to 60 meteors an hour. The best way to catch one of these beauties blazing across the sky is to find a dark location just after midnight, let your eyes adjust and look towards the North. These meteors radiate from the constellation Perseus, but can be spotted anywhere in the night sky.

On the 21st August a 'once in a life time' event occurs known as a total solar eclipse. Unfortunately this rare phenomenon can't be seen from our villages, but I am sure the news will be full of images of the moon completely blocking out the sun. When this happens the Sun's beautiful outer atmosphere, known as the Corona, will appear as a blazing ring in the sky.

Another celestial phenomenon which can be seen by us is known as 'noctilucent' clouds. Now these are not any ordinary clouds, but occur in a layer of the Earth's atmosphere known as the mesosphere. These are icy clouds that are so high up they are still illuminated by the sun long after it has set. Noctilucent means 'night shining' and they put on a display similar to the Northern Lights. The best time to catch one of these shining clouds is to look low down and close to the northwest horizon 90-120 minutes after sunset and a similar time before sunrise. They can take many different forms but will generally appear as electric blue or bright white waves across the sky, and the month of August is the best time to view this night-time light show.

Rights of Way

The Wiltshire Highways Authority Northern Rights of Way Officer, Stephen Leonard, gave an excellent presentation followed by a very useful discussion on the division of responsibility regarding rights of way in the Parish between his department, landowners and the Parish Council.

Neighbourhood Plan

There will be a further 14 days public consultation on the Neighbourhood Plan so that it can be commented on in the light of the adoption of the Chippenham Site Allocation Plan and some policy modifications made prior to it being submitted to the Independent Examiner.

Community Emergency Plan

The Community Emergency Plan is being revised to ensure the Parish is able to provide the best possible support to our residents and to the emergency services in the event of an emergency situation arising.

Donations

The Citizens Advice Bureau provides essential support to many people at various times in their lives. The Parish Council will make a donation of £50 as it has done in previous years.

Highways

The Foxham West End Metrocount survey was carried out between 02/05/2017 and 12/05/2017. A total of 6,042 vehicles were checked. The average speed was 30.2mph. Consequently the Road Safety Department at Wiltshire Council will not sanction a Speedwatch initiative. An 18 ton weight limit had been placed on the road from Draycott's Straight to Lyneham which will undoubtedly cause problems for local businesses and farmers. It is anticipated that many more HGVs will be using Parish roads as a consequence.

This will be on 4th September at Bremhill Village Hall. It is hoped the Neighbourhood Policing Team will give a presentation followed by discussion.

Here Ties BENJAMIN TREMBLING Aged 92 Years who died December + 1822

Epitaph on an Old Soldier, written by W.L. Bowles and carved on a stone, placed on the outside of the Chancel of Bremhill Church.

Here lies Benjamin Tremblin - Aged ninety-two years who died December 1 1822

A poor Old Soldier shall not lie unknown Without a verse on this recording stone. Twas his, in youth o'er distant lands to stray Danger and death, companions of his way. Clos'd the lone evening of his pilgrimage.

Speak of the past with names of high renown,
Or brave commanders long to dust gone down
His look with instant animation glow'd,
Tho' ninety winters on his head had snow'd.
His country, whilst he liv'd, a boon supplied
And Faith, her shield held o'er him when he died
Think. Christian, that his spirit lives with God,
And pluck the wild weeds from the lowly sod,
Where, dust to dust, beneath the chancel,s shade,
Till the last trump, a brave man's bones are laid.

This is a transcription of the stone on the Church. There are slight differences from the original pencil notes recently sold at auction. Various contemporary newspapers reporting on the poem have also made slight alterations. The name of the old soldier according to a transcription of the burial register is Benjamin Trembling rather than Tremblin as inscribed, who was buried in the churchyard on 5th December 1822. If anybody can find the headstone, please contact the history group. A "boon" is an old fashioned word equivalent to a pension today.
