#### TYTHERTON VILLAGE HALL UPDATE


By now it's hopefully well known that the lease for the Tytherton Village Hall is going to expire and that we need to build a new one elsewhere. The first challenge was to find a site, and at the end of last year we were delighted to get confirmation that the Baker Trust is provisionally willing to make some land available for us, shown as 'SITE' on the map.

It's a central site with many neighbours and we have investigated whether it's possible to have the choice of an alternative. However, none is available to us. Instead, we wish to ensure that any hall built on the offered site is a benefit to the nearby residents and that its impact is minimised. In particular, it means we intend to add formal conditions about the use of the new hall: it would not be let out for outside weddings and parties, but reserved for community use by residents of our villages and of the wider parish. Of course, avoiding commercial hire means we need to raise more money ourselves, and fund-raising is the next big challenge. The total cost may exceed £300,000.

In order of decreasing significance, we expect to get funds from donations, grants, and events. Donations could be one-off sums, or a regular payment of a much smaller amount every month over a period of time. Grants are not as generous as they were a few years ago, but some money is still available from companies (such as Hills), trusts, and government schemes. Fund-raising events will be targeted at attracting people – and money – from outside the area, not those locally who are already donating. Of course, we will also still run the usual social events within the Tythertons, but they will be priced just to cover their costs.

The main fund-raising will start when we have a concept design to show what we intend to build. Those who came to our AGM in May, or to the Spring Ball, were able to comment on the initial ideas from three possible architects. We have just interviewed them and by the time this newsletter is published one should have been appointed. As well as providing an outline concept, one of the architect's first tasks will be to create a preliminary site plan for consultation; we would like everyone – especially the immediate neighbours – to be able to help shape the design of our new hall and its setting.

#### A LONE WOMAN IN THE STOCK EXCHANGE

In 1969, I joined Sheppards and Chase, stockbrokers of 140 years' standing possibly not a logical progression after reading Spanish and French at university, and a leap of faith also for the partnership as they had never employed a woman at executive level before.

Stockbroking in those days bore little relation to "fund management" now. The firm's computer took up a whole room and produced vast quantities of the basic paperwork - contract notes, transfer forms, statements. Every contract note had to be signed by a partner - it was several years before we had a facsimile signature. There were no desk top terminals nor electronic calculators. I shared a cylindrical mechanical calculator called a Curta which was only one step removed from a slide rule!

I arrived in the City towards the end of the Australian mining boom and four years later, in February 1973, the London Stock Exchange admitted women members for the first time. I regret to say this happened at the start of the bear market which lasted until December 1974 and which saw the Stock Market lose 73% of its value. No wonder the members had tried to keep women out! I well remember the three day week working by candlelight.

The advance of technology in stockbroking as elsewhere had its advantages and disadvantages. In the early days, every deal was agreed on the Stock Exchange floor between a jobber and a broker, between whom "My word is my bond". At the time of the next "crash" in 1987, deals were taking place by telephone based on prices on computer screens which could change every second and were highlighted in red and blue. This was not conducive to calm conditions and was liable to cause panic, particularly among those who had never seen a bear market before.

I was offered a partnership in 1976 - a lone woman amongst 38 charming men! I was the only woman partner in the firm's history as it was taken over at the time of Big Bang in 1986.


















#### **CORNISH PASTIES**

Ancient chant to remind cooks not to burn the pasty!

A pasty sat high in a tree chuckling with fiendish glee
Although he knew upon the ground the hungry clan were gathered round
For he were baked in such a heat he were unfit for they to eat
And so he sat there cracking jokes and shouting "time for dinner folks!"



There are more arguments about how to make a pasty than the number of people who do. This is the way my granny taught me. One particular point, should they be crimped on the top or on the side? Traditionally miners' pasties were done on the side as, having no means to wash their hands, and given the tin, arsenic and other elements handled, meant that if one held them by the crimped side, this bit could be discarded, thus avoiding some nasty side effects.

As we lived in an agricultural region, ours were closed at the top. Short crust or rough puff pastry? Personally I buy puff pastry in blocks from the supermarket as it saves time. Do not buy rump steak as skirting is cheaper and tastes better.

Fine chop one large onion, dice three potatoes and eight ounces (no metric) of beef skirt. Add a little diced swede if to your taste. Season liberally especially with the pepper. Roll out the pastry so that you can cut two dinner plate sized circles and use the offcuts to make a third. Place one third of the vegetable mix in the centre of each and one third of the meat spread over the top of this. This allows the meat flavours to run down on the vegetables.

Brush half the outer with milk, draw the half circles together and crimp to seal. Beat one egg and brush the tops. Place on tray greased with butter and cook at 180 for 50 minutes.

Allow to cool for 10 minutes and do not serve with chips, peas or anything else!

Delightful one plate meal, hot, cold or somewhere in between. The original convenience food, totally portable! Will keep for 24 hours in fridge.

Sometimes jam was put at one end separated by a pastry barrier but this has never really worked for me!

#### JAPANESE EXPERIENCES

We had a week's honeymoon and then did the first year of Sheffield University's Japanese course in one week before joining the second year. We were then sent out to Japan in 1967 and Michael was the only foreigner in the Osaka branch office. For the two and half years he was there, no one spoke a word of English to him.

We lived in a Japanese house. The room dividers were paper screens and the wooden bath tub was sunk into the floor. You had to fill it with cold water, put the lid on and go outside to light the heater. It took an hour to heat up so the whole family uses the same bath water which is why you wash before you get into the bath. There is a drain in the bathroom floor so you pour clean water over yourself before you get in. You take your shoes off before you enter a Japanese house so there is a rack of slippers in the porch.

The first day Michael went off to the office the doorbell rang. A man gave me his business card. As the Chinese symbols used have no alphabet, it takes a long time to find them in a dictionary. On eventually discovering that he was the honourable cesspit emptier I had no idea where the cesspit was or whether it was full or empty.

Japanese gardeners pluck the leaves on their trees. One day when I was breastfeeding our baby, I found a man on a branch staring right at me. The trees used to sway during earthquakes.

When our children were 8 months and two years old, we went skiing and stayed in a Japanese-style hotel. We all slept on the floor in the same room and the children clambered over us all night. There was one large communal bath for women and one for men. We washed before we entered and I clasped the children firmly to me as all the Japanese women stared at us. We had cold rice and seaweed for breakfast.

Michael was transferred to Tokyo and we lived in Yokohama, about 25 miles away, overlooking the port where all the Japanese cars were being exported to the UK and oil pipe lines to Siberia. It was the start of the great economic boom in Japan. Sometimes on the News it announced that the air was too polluted for children to play outside - the price of progress.

Japan does not have street names (with a few exceptions, mostly in the middle of big cities) and houses are numbered by the order in which they were built - so 119 might be next to 44. Each area has its own policeman who directs people to the right place. It is important to befriend him. Luckily he liked my coffee which made that much easier. One time when we were away we were burgled and I had a long lecture from him because I had not told him were going away, so he could have looked after the house. I bowed deeply and apologized.

Living in Japan made us look at our own country from the outside. The language is not based on Graeco-Roman logic - this again makes one think differently.

#### Dear All

I am writing this on the small island of Madeira. The weather is cloudy and fine - an interesting mix; the people generous and kind. There are microclimates which mean it can be overcast in one place but just down the road it is sunny and hot. Different climates bring arid land alongside lush, green and tropical hillsides. There is a strip of yellow sanded beach (man-made) alongside the natural black and rocky beach for the locals as well as the visitors to enjoy.

We have journeyed in the cable car to the top of the mountain. We looked down upon mixed housing, whether large or small it was either well maintained or poorly maintained. All mixed together on the hillside in close proximity to one another.

The poor and the wealthy live alongside one another and the crime rate is virtually non-existent. The outboard motors left hooked to the tiny boats they propel are testament to the community of trust that prevails.

The restaurants are relaxed and friendly - service is with a generous smile. Nothing is too much trouble and yet quiet, relaxed and efficient.

There is little animal life on the island - it takes time to spot a cow, a goat, a cat, a dog! There are no acres of cereal or plants growing commercially. Most food appears to be being grown for personal use; much is imported. Much effort is concentrated on the practical creation of road infrastructure through and around the mountainous island.

Work is undertaken quietly and efficiently. Yes, modern gadgets exist, phones and tablets included - but they are tools, not life-givers.

I cannot help but wonder how this fine marriage between modern living and traditional God given values could be reintroduced into our own beloved country, bringing peace, life and refreshment to all!
