When talking about our need to build a new village hall - when the lease for the current site expires in little more than a year - we are often asked why we can't just use an existing building such as the Guiding Centre (former school) in East Tytherton. The simple answer is that no building is suitable. The Guiding Centre doesn't have a hall, only smaller rooms; even if the Guides were interested in sharing their long-term lease we would still need to build a very substantial extension. The churches in East Tytherton and Tytherton Lucas have the largest rooms but one could hardly imagine installing a skittle alley and a bar! At our AGM last year we concluded that there was no choice but to build a new hall.

Of course building a new hall requires a new location. Our update in the August newsletter showed the site that had been provisionally offered by the Baker Trust. We had gone on to start designing a plan for this site but it was proving difficult to mitigate the concerns of all the immediate neighbours. As a consequence, the Baker Trust last month kindly extended their (provisional) offer to a few other possible sites. We will now conduct a formal consultation of residents to determine which of these sites is most appropriate.

BROADBAND UPDATE

As we explained in November, locations around Foxham and East Tytherton are to get a much needed upgrade to the broadband infrastructure serving homes and businesses in this area. It cannot be stressed enough that the quality of the phone wiring in your property could be the main cause of current poor broadband performance so we would encourage you to re-read the previous article and try its suggestions first.

So what is happening now? The government has been running a scheme known as BDUK for several years, each council has been given funds to spend on updating broadband connections in its area. Wiltshire Council has joined with South Gloucestershire Council and contracted BT Openreach to install a new improved broadband infrastructure. The target is to provide as many people as possible with connections which can download at 24Mb/s or better. Previous ADSL broadband speeds were limited to a maximum of 8Mb/s in our area. Achieving speeds of 24Mb/s would be a good improvement for all of us although it is highly likely that many will get speeds greater than 40Mb/s. A small number of people will only see modest speed improvements due to the very long phone lines, some greater than 6km, connecting them to their telephone exchange. Another round of government funding known as BDUK2 is just starting and this should see the remainder of properties getting an update in a few years' time.

BT Openreach has installed new cabinets in East Tytherton and at Teal Farm in Foxham. Although the work to enable these cabinets was officially scheduled to be completed at the end of December, BT Openreach was, in fact, looking to complete ahead of schedule in October. Unfortunately, BT Openreach discovered that an underground duct needs to be unblocked so that fibre cables can be laid. The work to clear the blockage will happen in early December and will require closing a part of the road between East Tytherton and Langley Burrell near the Avon River. Assuming this work allows the cabinets to be enabled shortly thereafter and no new problem is found, it should be possible to place orders for Fibre Broadband with a number of Internet Service Providers from the end of December.

Bremhill Village Hall Purchase

When my ancestor built Bremhill Church School in 1846, the 3rd Marquis wisely included a clause that if the building was not being used for the purpose for which it was constructed, it would revert as an asset of the estate. When the school closed, the village enjoyed the use of the premises for nineteen years at a peppercorn rent on the full repairing basis, until it fell into disrepair.

It was about this time that I had to make some difficult decisions to rationalise the future of Bowood as a whole. We were in the process of building the golf course and decided to concentrate our resources on creating a business which, with a fair wind, would secure the Estate for the future. This meant re-trenching from the outlying areas, such as Bremhill. So there was no easy way we could afford to enter into an extended lease on a peppercorn basis. We had to make better use of our assets. This meant offering the hall for sale. The meeting I requested in 1991 was to explore this possibility. It was suggested there were no concrete proposals. However, there were. We were no longer able to afford the luxury of allowing valuable assets to lie fallow. So I arranged for a formal valuation to be carried out. It was valued at £30,000.

Once the decision was made by the Village Hall Committee to purchase the building and fund raising had commenced, I was happy to discuss a discounted price of £20,000, and extend a completion date. Those were the facts from Bowood's perspective.

So looking back, I believe there were winners all round. The community for having a facility for 19 years at a peppercorn rent and then purchasing the building at a 33% discount. Overall, an honourable outcome for both the community and Bowood.

PRIVATE ARTHUR JOHN BESANT, SERVICE NUMBER 8027

Born 1885 - Died 28th November 1914. 29 years of age

The end of November 1914 was a terrible time for Britain. As well as the retreat from Mons, HMS Bulwark blew up in Sheerness Water with the loss of 736 crew members. This was also when the 29 year old Arthur Besant lost his life. Arthur is remembered at Rue-Petillion Military cemetery, Fleurbaix N.France, which is a village 5 km south-west of Armentieres on the D22.


He is not remembered on the Bremhill war memorial as both of his parents were deceased. Arthur was born and lived in Turf Lane. He was the Son of Simon Besant and Emma Simpkins, who had married at St Martins in 1870. His father Simon (or Simeon in some records) died aged 41 years, when Arthur was only 3 years old in 1888. Brought up by his mother, Emma, who in 1901 was living in Charlcutt. She describes herself as a Charwoman whilst Arthur, now 16 years old, was an agricultural Labourer, living at home with his sisters.

By 1911 Arthur was a full time soldier in the 2nd Battalion, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, stationed in Bloemfontein in South African Orange Free State. On peacekeeping duties after the Boer war he transferred to the 1st Battalion and served in Dublin based at the Curragh race track.

1st Battalion, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry were at the Curragh in Ireland serving with 14th Brigade, 5th Division when war was declared in August 1914. They proceeded to France, landing at Le Havre on the 15th. They were then in action in The Battle of Mons and the subsequent retreat.

After the war, Arthur was awarded, posthumously, the Victory, British and 1914 Star medals these were often called the Pip, Squeak and Wilfred medals.

The Mons Star (Pip) bronze medal award was authorized by King George V in April 1917 for those who had served in France or Belgium, between 5th August 1914 to midnight on 22nd November 1914 inclusive. The award was open to officers and men of the British and Indian Expeditionary Forces, doctors and nurses as well as Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Royal Navy Reserve and Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve who served ashore with the Royal Naval Division in France or Belgium.

FRIENDS SINCE 1770!

The Friends of St Martin has always been a community focused organisation run by volunteers stemming from a Friendly Society formed in 1770 when 75 members paid one shilling a week into a fund. If a member became sick they received six shillings a week in benefit for up to three months. The fund was also used for burials and a wakes at the Dumb Post Inn. Members also celebrated Festival Day on Whit Wednesday with a dinner after which they had to walk to the Bell and Organ, an ale house in Bremhill, now a private

home. The field path they walked was known as Parade Walk and still exists today. As they approached the village square they were obliged to walk twice around the village cross and drink a short pot of ale, a ceremony which along with the Society lapsed over time.



In 1979 Friends of St. Martin was formed, re-awakening the spirit of the original Friendly Society holding local events to raise money in order to help support the fabric of the local church, and later, to support worthwhile projects and groups in the community. The amount of money raised in the last few years is now vastly different from earlier accounts. According to audited reports since 2001 over £50,000 has been raised and dispersed to many local organisations. Recipients have included Maude Heaths School, the Over 60's Club, the Sunday School, Bremhill Village Hall, the Youth Club and more recently, Young Farmers, North Wilts Children's Holiday Club and young people with special needs, as well as the PCC.

One of the mainstay fundraising events is the annual Auction of Promises where as much fun is had bidding for a few hours of gardening, a home made cake, right up to dinner parties, and to holiday homes rental. The Friends also manage the village marquee helped by other volunteers who erect the marquee many times a year for local events and raise funds in the process.

This year the Auction of Promises will be on Friday 30th January with entry only £5 at The Long Barn in Bremhill. If you haven't attended before it is a fun evening with a buffet and bar, so come along!... and please do contribute with a promise or two so the good work of the volunteers can continue. Details are on page 19. Notes from this years AGM are on page 25.

DISASTER INTO VICTORY IN ONE DAY

Nery 1st September 1914

My wife, Jophy, and I were able to go to Nery, 48 miles from Paris, to represent The Queen's Bays, my old regiment, on the centenary of the battle, which took place on 1 Sept 1914. The 1st Cavalry Brigade consisted of The Bays, 5th Dragoon Guards and 11th Hussars, supported by 13 field guns of L Battery, similar to the ones used by the King's Troop today. They had pulled into the village of Nery for the night on their retreat from Mons. This is an ancient village with well built farmhouses and with a Roman road running through it.

The Dragoon Guards and the Hussars got there first and found shelter. The Bays and the L Battery had to make do in the surrounding fields. Road blocks and patrols were set up at first light. The order to move out at 5 am was postponed because of thick fog. A horseman in his saddle could hardly see the horse's head!

A patrol reported seeing German Lancers near the village on high ground and were able to sound the alarm. Soon the village was heavily shelled by the Germans causing considerable damage to the field guns and the Bays in the fields. Only one field gun was kept in action until it ran out of ammunition. The three remaining men were awarded the VC, one posthumously. The Bays and the rest of the Brigade engaged the enemy with machine guns and rifles, overcoming the German Cavalry Division. This action halted the German advance on Paris and paved the way to the forthcoming victory at the Battle of the Marne.

The inhabitants of Nery have kept this action alive over the last 100 years by their unerring friendship and hospitality. This year the Kings Troop were present at the commemoration with their field guns and the Ghurka band, with relatives and representatives of the Cavalry Brigade. We were proud to be there and lay a wreath on the VCs' Memorial.

A strange thing happened on the morning of the 1st Sept 2014, exactly 100 years on. We opened the shutters of our accommodation early that morning to find a thick fog hanging over the landscape!

Recipients who received the medal with the clasp were also entitled to attach a silver heraldic rose to the ribbon when just the ribbon was being worn.

The reverse is plain with the recipient's service number, rank, name and unit impressed on it. It should be remembered that those awarded this medal were responsible for assisting the French to hold back the German army while new recruits could be trained and equipped. Collectively, they fully deserve a great deal of honour for their part in the first sixteen weeks of the Great War. This included the battle of Mons, the retreat to the Seine, the battles of Le Cateau, the Marne, the Aisne and the 1st battle of Ypres. There were approximately 378,000 Stars issued.

WHAT IS THE FUTURE FOR NHS SERVICES IN WILTSHIRE?

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is led by local GPs. We plan and pay for the majority of NHS services that you use across the county. Over the next five years, we know that demand for NHS services in Wiltshire will continue to increase, but the money we have available to spend on these services will not increase at the same rate.

Modern advances in healthcare are helping people to live for longer than ever before which is a cause for celebration. However, this does mean that the demand for NHS services from the over-65s is expected to increase significantly over the coming years. As a result, the CCG needs to adapt the way we provide NHS services so that they better meet the needs of our ageing population.

How will we meet this challenge?

The CCG has developed a Five Year Plan to enable us to respond to this challenge. Our key partners like Wiltshire Council, GP surgeries, local hospitals and other NHS providers are vital to the success of the plan.

Our model for the future of health care in Wiltshire is based on three key principles:

- 1. Encourage and support Wiltshire residents to take on more responsibility for their own health and wellbeing
- 2. Provide fair access to a high quality and affordable system of care for the greatest number of people
- 3. Provide less care in hospitals and more care at home or in the community

To achieve these aims we will:

- 1. Spend more money on health education and prevention to help people take more personal responsibility for their health and wellbeing
- 2. Spend more money to improve community care and increase the range of services provided in a local setting
- 3. As a result, we would need to spend proportionately less money on providing bed-based care in hospital

We are going to split Wiltshire up into 20 clusters of approximately 20,000 people. Each cluster will have an integrated team of GP surgeries, community nurses and therapists together with social worker support which will work together to ensure that we have a more joined up system of health and social care.

How can you get more involved?

Each Area Board is planning a health fair in the next few months with different stalls for you to visit followed by presentations from the CCG and Wiltshire Council about our plans for improving health and social care. DOORWAY.

On Saturday 4th October, I took non-perishable items from our Harvest Festival to Doorway, the charity which helps homeless and needy people in Chippenham and the surrounding area by providing meals, showering facilities and also clothing. It is staffed by helpers and is based in a premises in Frogwell. It helps everyone who comes to them and consequently is very grateful for donations from the public.

It was raining when I arrived. It was early for me, it was only 9 am, but I was not the first, two other cars were unloading their produce before me. It looked like Harvest Festival produce too.

As I carried a bag of goodies up the stairs I had to pass a group of eight or nine people all standing silently in the rain, waiting for the doors to open for them to go inside in the warm for their breakfast, a wash and a shower.

These people knew they would be welcomed and helped no matter what their circumstances. I tried not to stare but could not help noticing a young man, who I guessed was in his early twenties, who stood with what appeared to be all his belongings in two plastic bags. I saw a sleeping bag in one. I wondered where he had spent the previous night.

I felt very humbled by what I saw. Seeing these people with so little, I was glad to be taking in a few things to help improve their quality of life.

We have received a letter of thanks, addressed to the church, for our offering. It states how grateful the staff are for offerings and how welcome the gifts were. The letter, which was addressed to all members of the congregation who had contributed, assured us that the produce will be well used. I am delighted to pass on these comments to all those who have generously contributed this year.

RECIPE - RAISED PIE - SERVES 8 TO 10.

Hot Water Crust Pastry (don't be put off by this, it is very straight forward)

265 g plain flour. 55g white bread flour.

55 butter (cubed). 65 g lard.

1 tspn salt. 135 ml boiling water.

1 beaten egg for glazing.

Filling

4 pheasant breasts chopped finely. 2 cloves garlic crushed.

Mixed together and marinated for 30mins

2 chicken breasts chopped.
2 tspns dried thyme.
100 g smoked bacon finely chopped.
1/2 jar of cranberry jelly.

400 g sausage meat - I used pork and apple

1 x 8" spring release cake tin.

Method

Heat oven to 220°c / gas 7

- 1. Prepare all meats first as the pastry needs to be hot when handling it or it will become too dry to use.
- 2. Place flour in bowl, add butter rub in well.
- 3. Heat lard in a pan with the water, pour this liquid on to the flour mix with a wooden spoon until all liquid absorbed and dough is formed.
- 4. Working quickly, take ¾ of the dough, roll out and line tin covering the base and sides with overlapped pastry hanging over the lip of the tin. Leave remaining dough in a warm place.
- 5. Taking half the pheasant, bacon, garlic, thyme mix to form the first layer.
- 6. Form a second layer with the sausage meat.
- 7. The third layer will be the cranberry jelly, spread over the sausagemeat.
- 8. Chopped chicken is the fourth layer.
- 9. The remaining pheasant mixture forms the final layer.
- 10. Press firmly down.

- 11. Roll out remaining 1/3rd pastry into a circle to form the top of the pie, dampen the edges and place over the tin. Pierce the lid to let out the steam.
- 12. Crimp pastry edges together with finger and thumb, brush with beaten egg.
- 13. Place in oven on a baking tray, turning the temperature down to 160°c / gas 3 for 1 hour 20 mins. Continue glazing with egg every 20 mins throughout cooking.

N.B. to prevent the pie becoming too dark a baking tray can be placed on the rack above it if necessary.

Once cooled, place it in the refrigerator, it is best eaten cold with pickles and good friends!

THE BURNING OF THE LEAVES

Laurence Binyon (1869 - 1943)

Now is the time for the burning of the leaves,
They go to the fire; the nostrils prick with smoke
Wandering slowly into the weeping mist.
Brittle and blotched, ragged and rotten sheaves!
A flame seizes the smoldering ruin, and bites
On stubborn stalks that crackle as they resist.

The last hollyhock's fallen tower is dust:
All the spices of June are a bitter reek,
All the extravagant riches spent and mean.
All burns! the reddest rose is a ghost.
Spark whirl up, to expire in the mist: the wild
Fingers of fire are making corruption clean.
Now is the time for stripping the spirit bare,
Time for the burning of days ended and done,
Idle solace of things that have gone before,
Rootless hope and fruitless desire are there:

Let them go to the fire with never a look behind.

That world that was ours is a world that is ours no more.

They will come again, the leaf and the flower, to arise
From squalor of rottenness into the old splendor,
And magical scents to a wondering memory bring;
The same glory, to shine upon different eyes.

Earth cares for her own ruins, naught for ours.

Nothing is certain, only the certain spring.

Binyon is most often considered a poet of the First World War, but his poem, "The Burning of the Leaves" was written in 1942, shortly before his death. He speaks about how fire can be cleansing and prepare for re-birth and regrowth and it is easy to see how the description of autumn to spring can apply also to a world caught in conflict, giving hope for the future.
