

POLICE REPORT

Police report - latest NPT news

Speed Enforcement

Our speed checks in the Rural areas continue. On 28th April, 2015 we attended East Tytherton where a check was completed at the 30mph limit. 7 drivers were given verbal warnings for driving slightly over the limit. 2 were issued with £100 Fixed Penalty notices for travelling at 43 and 52 mph. This offence carries 3 penalty points on a driving licence.

Rural Crime

Further reports this month of crime committed in the Rural Area include an overnight burglary at Ratford on 6th May. During the afternoon of 6th May, a child's Nemesis bike was ridden off by a male who took it from a private garage. At Cherhill White Horse lay-by, a handbag and contents were stolen from a parked car during the afternoon of 11th May. Please be mindful that the rural areas of Wiltshire are currently suffering a spate of thefts and burglaries, so try to put extra security on outer buildings, as the burglaries shown here have all occurred in outer buildings. Outside lights are always a good deterrent.

Fraud involving Fishmongers

Please can I make you aware of Fishmongers who are travelling Wiltshire and the Calne area in an unmarked white van. They are fraudulent and there have been reports of them targeting the elderly by getting them to buy fish and pay by card. Then, instead of a person believing they are paying £3.50, they take £350! The banks are aware of the scam, but if you see anything suspicious, then please report it on either 101 or 999. We are increasing our patrols and working with intelligence from trading standards to target these individuals.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Where are we now?

The Neighbourhood Plan, developed from the original questionnaire sent to all households in the Parish, sets out development within our area over the next fifteen years and has considered a wide range of important aspects affecting local life. There has been good feedback from the presentations, and the Steering Group continues to add to the plan.

During the past two years, the Steering Group of the Bremhill Parish Council has been investigating mobility and public transport within the area, but with a concern, too, about increasing traffic and speeds on our narrow roads. In addition, they have investigated flooding, access to open spaces, employment opportunities within the Parish and plans for renewable energy. How best to protect the historical environment and the range of possible leisure activities have also been examined.


Good work continues by the group looking at the high-speed fibre broadband, or lack of it, according to many of your comments. Your help in forwarding details of performance across the parish will provide a benchmark to move into the future, with hopefully some improvements, once BT gets all the connectivity.

Parishioners expressed most concern about the conservation of green spaces and wild life, and worried about the two local towns encroaching on our area from both west and east with new housing developments. The Steering Group has met with the directors of Chippenham 2020 to discuss their intention to build executive homes along the bank of the river Marden, and then back towards Chippenham. A relatively high bridge will be put across the River Avon, spanning some 500 metres from the north side to the south side. The parish has delivered a clear mandate, as 90% of you responded to the exit survey at the presentations that you want to see green space between our villages and towns. The parish council discussed invitations to meet further with Chippenham 2020 at the May meeting.









The questionnaire showed that there was support for a degree of mixed housing development across the Parish. This section has now been completed, and all the proposed sites have been visited and assessed. It appears that the Hatts site at Foxham has been sold and may remain as a commercial site.

The Steering Group continues to work on our behalf producing the first draft for review by the parish which will be a sizeable document, based on the evidence of the questionnaire. It will be delivered later in June for review, and will be available in the two public houses, village halls and on line at bremhillparish.org. The exact date of its appearance will be published on the web-site and Parish noticeboards. Anyone who does not have a computer, or is unable to get out to review the plan, please contact your ward parish councillor. The consultation will be for 6 weeks. The Plan will then go to Chippenham Council for review for 6 weeks. This 6-week period will be very important, and we welcome any feedback so that we can fine-tune the draft before it goes to the County Council. Preliminary talks have already been held with Wiltshire Council and developers.

Your views have informed the Parish Council on how many in the parish work, how many of you appreciate the countryside, the village halls, and the two public houses. The Plan will be a true representative document of the way of life in Bremhill parish in the 21st century. Please consider it carefully as it is your future.



In Memory of

PRIVATE OLIVER ARTHUR HENLY

2nd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment 18210

Born 1892 at East Tytherton Died 15th June 1915 at Givenchy, France. 23 years of age.

Oliver was born in 1892 to 19 year-old Fanny Henly at East Tytherton. Prior to this in 1891 Fanny had for a short time been working in a guest house at Weston Super Mare, as a servant. Oliver grew up and went to school in Tytherton. In 1901 Fanny married Walter Chivers, a bricklayer's labourer from Stanley, just down the road from Cat Brook Cottages, East Tytherton where they lived. After getting married, Walter took on Oliver and in 1911 he was mentioned in the census as his stepson, working as a farm labourer and living along with the four other children of Walter and Fanny, Oscar, Osborne, Frances and Olive.

Before the First World War local farming was suffering from a rise in imports of basic foodstuff and at some time after 1911 Oliver moved, along with several other local lads, to better themselves working in the growing coal mines and associated industry of South Wales. It was from Pontygwaith in the Rhondda that Oliver signed up as a volunteer in Devizes and joined the 2nd Battalion of the Wiltshire regiment.

Oliver went over the top at Givenchy, France, into a barrage of machine gun

fire on the evening of 15th June 1915. He was killed in that action along with many of his Wiltshire chums. Oliver has no known grave but is remembered locally and on Le Touret memorial.







In Memory of

PRIVATE HAROLD JOHN KING

2nd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment 13969

Born 9th June 1897 at Charlcutt Died 15th June 1915 at Givenchy, France. 18 years of age.

Harold was the son of George King and Florence (nee Wilkins) who lived at No10 Charlcutt. George, who was born in Bremhill, spent all his life working in Bremhill farms as a carter. Married to Florence Wilkins in 1893, the family grew rapidly and by 1911 they had 6 children, 4 girls and 2 boys. Harold joined the April 1897 class intake at Bremhill school with school number 146. In 1911 he was living with his siblings and parents, still at No 10 Charlcutt and by now working as a farm labourer.

Both boys served in the army in WW1, Harold died but elder brother Herbert Charles King survived and his name is on the Bremhill and District roll of honour in St Martins. Harold died one week after his 18th birthday, 51 weeks under the age to serve overseas and was only 17 years old when his Battalion sailed to France in March 1915. Until 1916 all recruits were volunteers and, although official government policy was that you had to be 18 years old or older to sign up and 19 years old or older to serve overseas, many people did not have birth certificates, so it was very easy to lie about your age. It is estimated that in 1915 as many as 250,000 under-age men joined the services. There was a lot of pressure both from peer groups and from recruiting officers who were paid two shillings and sixpence (about £6 now) for each recruit signed up.

Early June 1915 saw mining operations (mines under the enemy trenches) in the Givenchy sector in preparation for a big offensive scheduled for the middle of the month. The Wiltshires, who were to take part in the first wave, moved up to the front on the night of the 14th -15th June and relieved sections of the Scots Guards in order to be ready in their jumping-off positions.

At 6 pm on June 15th the men went over the top, the mine was exploded and back-up artillery was fired. The moment the men went over the top, the enemy machine-guns swept them with a blaze of gunfire. Harold's body was





never found but he is remembered on panel 33 / 34 on the Le Touret memorial as well as our local war memorials. At a later date it was discovered from prisoners that the enemy was aware and well prepared for that evening's attack after tapping the telephone lines.

C and D companies of the 2nd Battalion Wiltshire regiment were decimated on this evening. At this stage of the war, regiments recruited volunteers locally. It was a bad day for Wiltshire.

I have been on a Quiet Morning in Braydon Methodist Chapel today. The simplicity of it, along with the distinct slant on hospitality, was so welcoming.

In such an environment it was easy to forget about the financial demands that go with maintaining an Anglican Church with all its majesty and grandeur. The Methodist Church in which we discerned God's presence would have been relatively cheap to keep in good repair, and I imagine would not be subject to the lengthy process for permission to redecorate or change in any way. The place could be loved and cared for in the present and through, most of the time I believe, the support of its members. It really was a home in which God dwelt.

I cannot help but wonder, as lovely as our church buildings are, how much closer we could come to God, and being God's labourers in the field, if we did not have our ancient beautiful churches to maintain and we led a much simpler way of life in worshipping God! How much easier it may be to discern what God requires of us when all the opulence is swept away!
