<p>During the middle of 1918, the 2nd Battalion were involved in many skirmishes with the enemy and also involved in the training of the newly arrived American and Australian troops. Frederick would have played an active role in this and in particular on October 9th and 10th, 1918 in preparation for taking part in the battle of the St Quentin canal. The 2nd Worcester's were involved in a night-time operation on the 11th, assisting the sappers laying bridges. Whilst we cannot be sure, it is likely that Frederick was killed or mortally injured during or at the time of this operation.</p>								
25th September 1920 Frederick was posthumously awarded the British War & Victory Medals
