## **Broad Chalke**



**Broad Chalke** is a parish and village, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Chalke, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry, and Chalke rural deanery, 8 miles south-west from Salisbury, and 92 from London. The river Ebele runs through the parish.

The church of All Saints belongs to the beginning of the 15<sup>th</sup> century, and is supposed to have been built by Prebendary Leyot. Its bells are mentioned by Aubrey, who lived in the parish; four out of the six are now broken. The fabric was renovated in 1847. It is cruciform, with large south porch and massive embattled tower. The register dates from 1538. The living is a vicarage, with Bower Chalke annexed, yearly value £138, with residence, in the gift of King's College, Cambridge and held by the Rev. William Henry Whitting, M.A., of that college.

Here is a National school for boys and girls; also an Independent chapel.

The Earl of Pembroke is lord of the manor, and principal landowner.

The soil is chalk; subsoil, same. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats.

The area is 6,934 acres; gross estimated rental, £7,108; rateable value, £6,243; the population in 1871 was 811.
