

Post Office Directory Extract 1855 Cherhill



CHERILL or CHERHILL, is a township, parish and village on the high road from Calne to Marlborough; in Calne Hundred and Union, 2½ miles east from Calne, and 8 north from Devizes. The church is very ancient, with square embattled tower and four pinnacles; the living is a perpetual curacy, in the patronage of the Bishop of Salisbury and diocese of Wilts. On the side of a chalk hill in the parish is a figure of a horse, 157 feet long, cut out of turf; it was executed under the direction, and at the expense, of Christopher Allsop, Esq., an eminent physician of Calne, being the highest land between London and Bath; it is visible at the distance of between 20 and 30 miles in almost every direction. The population, in 1851, was 306; acreage, 1,817.

On the downs are barrows.

OLDBOROUGH, 1 mile south, was a Roman establishment; Labour in Vain Hill is half a mile west; Marsh Lane half a mile north-west
