Chicklade

Chicklade is a village and parish, 16 miles west from Salisbury, 6 ½ north-east from Shaftesbury, and 6 north-west from Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway, in the Southern division of the county, Dunworth hundred, Hindon petty sessional division, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, Chalke rural deanery Tisbury portion, archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury.

The church of All Saints was rebuilt of stone in a plain style, in 1832; it has a chancel and nave, a low square western turret, containing one bell, and will seat 120 persons. The register dates from 1721. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £145, including 32 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Marquess of Bath, and held since 1888 by the Rev. John Frederic Homan.

Alfred Morrison esq. D.L., J.P., of Fonthill House, Fonthill Gifford, who is lord of the manor, the trustees of the late Alfred Seymour esq. Knoyle House, East Knoyle, and Sir Michael Robert Shaw-Stewart bart. D.L., J.P., of Fonthill Abbey, are the principal landowners.

The soil is chalky; subsoil, chalk and flint. The area is 1,041 acres, mostly arable land; rateable value, £860; the population in 1881 was 97.

Letters through Hindon, which is the nearest money order & telegraph office, arrive at 7.30 a.m.

The children of the parish attend the school at Hindon.
