Percy Francis Connelly was born at Goulburn, New South Wales in 1892 to parents Francis & Emily Connelly (nee Windley). He was a 24 year old, single Labourer from Bangalow, Richmond River, NSW when he enlisted at Mackay, Queensland on 2nd November, 1916 with the 49th Infantry Battalion, 8th Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 3144 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his father – Francis Connelly of Bangalow, Richmond River, NSW.

Pte Percy Francis Connelly embarked from Sydney on HMAT *Demosthenes (A64)* on 23rd December, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 3rd March, 1917.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. These were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte Connelly was marched in to 13th Training Battalion at Codford on 4th March, 1917. He was admitted sick to New Zealand Hospital on 13th March, 1917.

Pte Percy Francis Connelly died at 4.10 a.m. on 19th March, 1917 at No. 3 New Zealand Military Hospital, Codford, Wiltshire.

A death for Percy F Connelly, aged 25, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

From the burial report of Pte Percy Francis Connelly – He was buried on 22nd March, 1917 at St. Mary's Parish Churchyard, Codford, Grave No. 82. *A wreath was put on the grave of Pte Connelly by the C.o.* 13th Training Battalion.

The Red Cross Wounded & Missing File for Pte Percy Francis Connelly has the following letter to the Secretary of Red Cross from the Lieut. – Col. N.Z.M.C. Officer Commanding No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital, dated August 11th, 1917:

He was admitted to this Hospital on March 7th last but his condition did not give cause for any undue alarm until he became much worse on March 17th when his Medical Officer placed him on the Seriously III list with Broncho-Pneumonia and to which effect we telegraphed the Australian Military Headquarters, London. In spite of every attention administered by Doctors and nurses, I regret to say that he became rapidly worse and died at 4.10 on the morning of March 19th. The deceased was accorded a Funeral with full Military Honours on March 22nd and he was buried in accordance with the Rites of his Church in Grave No.82 in the Australian portion of the Soldiers Cemetery at Codford St. Mary. I need hardly say how much we sympathise with the relatives and friends of the late Pte Connelly in the loss which they have sustained.

Private P. F. Connelly is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 148.



Pte Connelly was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Connelly's father – Mr Francis Connelly in August, 1922.
