Charles Tombs was born on 26<sup>th</sup> November, 1875 at Sefton, New Zealand, the son of Job & Elizabeth Tombs.

Charles Tombs married Eliza Alice Pound on 11<sup>th</sup> December, 1899 at Ashley Bank, Nth Canterbury. Charles & Alice had 4 children - Charles (born Blenheim, 22/10/1901); Arthur (born Blenheim, 26/4/1903); William (born Seddon, 29/6/1906) & Ronald (born Seddon, 8/3/1908).

Eliza Alice Tombs, wife of Charles Tombs, died in 1910.

He was a 40 year old, widower, Chainman with Public Works Dept. from Blenheim, New Zealand when he enlisted on 26<sup>th</sup> July, 1916 with the New Zealand Expeditionary Force. His service number was 31552 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his sister-in-law – Mrs R. Register of Arthur Street, Blenheim, New Zealand. Charles's children were aged 14 years, 13 years, 10 years & 8 years.

Mrs Maud Register was appointed by Charles Tombs to be guardian to his four children whilst he was on Active Service. Mrs Register was approved to be paid the Separation Allowance from 25<sup>th</sup> July, 1916 that was usually entitled to the wives of members of the N.Z. Expeditionary Force as she was the Guardian of Pte Tombs' four children.

Private Charles Tombs embarked with 19th Reinforcements Canterbury Infantry Battalion, C Company from Wellington, New Zealand on 15<sup>th</sup> November, 1916. Two Ships embarked that day - HMNZT (68) *Maunganui* & HMNZT (69) *Tahiti* – carrying a total of 2,036 men. Pte Tombs had been admitted to the Hospital's Ship – Transport 69 for 8 days with Bronchitis from 4<sup>th</sup> December to 12<sup>th</sup> December, 1916. He disembarked at Devonport, England on 29<sup>th</sup> January, 1917.

Private Charles Tombs was marched in to Sling Army Camp, Wiltshire on 29<sup>th</sup> January, 1917.

Private Charles Tombs was admitted to No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital, Codford, Wiltshire on 8<sup>th</sup> February, 1917 with asthma (slight) & later reported seriously ill with Bronchitis.

Private Charles Tombs died on 17<sup>th</sup> February, 1917 at No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital at Codford, Wiltshire of Bronchitis.

A death for Charles Toombs, aged 41, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire, England.

Private Charles Tombs was buried at St. Mary's New Cemetery, Codford.

Private Charles Tombs was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to his legal next-of-kin – Charles Tombs (eldest son) (July, 1921 & November, 1921).

The CWGC lists Private Charles Tombs, 31552, as the son of Job and Elizabeth Tombs. Born at Sefton, Canterbury.

### **PERSONAL NOTES**

Mrs R. Register has received a cablegram notifying the death, from an acute attack of bronchitis, at the general hospital at Codford, England, of her brother-in-law, Private Charles Tombs. Private Tombs left Marlborough with one of the later drafts, and was taken ill on arrival in England. He was sent to hospital, but gradually grew worse and eventually succumbed. The late soldier was linesman in the employment of the Public Works Department, and, previously to enlisting, was stationed at Ward. He was a widower, and leaves four children, who are being cared for by relatives.
