The Annual Codford Ball





The annual ball, held at Codford, in this county, on Friday, the 9th instant, was most respectably attended by upwards of 250 individuals, comprising not only the greater part of the families in the surrounding districts, but also many parties from long distances. The rooms, which were tastefully decorated, were completely occupied. Dancing was kept up with spirit and heartfelt enjoyment until nearly day-light, when the company reluctantly separated, not however, without the anticipation of spending many other happy meetings.

The annual Codford ball, under the auspices of the members of the Harmonic Society, took place on Thursday last. The attendance was as numerous and fashionable as the best wishes of its projectors could possibly desire, there being nearly 200 present, including many of the principal families in the neighbourhood. James Raxworthy, Esq., with that liberality which has characterized him on former occasions, granted the use of his rooms, which were admirably fitted up with transparencies, variegated lamps, &c., presenting quite an enchanting appearance. have its influence on the gay assemblage, for every one seemed disposed to be pleased, and on all sides were heard expressions of delight and approbation, rendering the scene highly animating. The pleasures of the evening were prolonged with the same joyous feelings until a late or rather early hour. Refreshments were provided by Brind, of the George Inn, who left nothing to be desired. The stewards were indefatigable in their endeavours to please – indeed, the whole of the arrangements were conducted in a manner worthy of the high repute of this Society, and cannot fail to render future Codford balls a source of the greatest attraction.
