

Lieutenant and Quartermaster Charged

At Warminster yesterday, EDWARD STIRLING BUCKLEY, a lieutenant of artillery stationed at Corton Camp, Codford, Wilts and THOMAS HENRY KENDALL, a quartermaster-sergeant of the same brigade, were charged with unlawfully converting Government property to their own use. Among the goods in question were 550 hair brushes, three service dress jackets, 70 pairs of overalls, 60 pairs of boots, 120 shirts, 80 kitbags, 54 hats, 70 towels, and two tons of iron horse-shoes.

No evidence was offered, but on the application of the police the accused were remanded until Thursday. Buckley was allowed bail in the sum of £40, but bail was refused in the case of Kendall.
