Commonwealth War Graves Headstone for Private O. A. Mincher is located in Last Row Grave Plot # 87 of Codford War Graves Cemetery (Using Map by Brian Marshall) (CWGC Reference - Grave # 126) Oswald Alan Arblaster Mincher was born on 11th October, 1888 at Northcote, New Zealand, the son of James & Elizabeth Mincher (nee Arblaster). He was a 27 year old, single, Carpenter from Northcote, New Zealand when he enlisted on 31st May, 1916 with the New Zealand Expeditionary Force. His service number was 26885 & his religion was Presbyterian. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr James Mincher of Northcote, New Zealand.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher was admitted to Hospital whilst at Trentham Camp, New Zealand on 17th June, 1916 suffering from influenza. He was discharged on 20th June, 1916. He was readmitted with influenza on 23rd June & discharged on 28th June, 1916.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher was admitted to Hospital whilst at Featherston Camp, New Zealand on 25th July, 1916 suffering from influenza. He was discharged on 28th July, 1916.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher embarked with 17th Reinforcements, Auckland Infantry Battalion, A Company from Wellington, New Zealand on HMNZT (64) *Devon* on 25th September, 1916, destination England. He disembarked at Devonport, England on 21st November, 1916.

Private Mincher was marched in to Sling Army Camp, Wiltshire on 21st November, 1916. He left for France from Sling Army Camp on 20th December, 1916.

Pte Mincher was marched into Camp at Etaples, France on 22nd December, 1916 & joined his Unit in the Field on 16th January, 1917.

On 6th October, 1917, Pte Mincher was admitted to No. 3 New Zealand Field Ambulance with appendicitis then transferred to No. 44 Cas. Clg. Station before being transferred to Ambulance Train on 8th October, 1917. Pte Mincher was admitted to Hospital at Wimereux, France on 9th October, 1917 & admitted to No. 1 Convalescent Hospital at Boulogne on 17th October, 1917.

Pte Mincher was attached to Base Depot at Etaples on 21st October, 1917. He was on Leave to UK from 1st December, 1917 & returned to his Battalion, in France, from Leave on 18th December, 1917.

On 10^{th} January, 1918 Pte Mincher was punished for "felling a tree without permission" – 7 Days F.P.

On 18th March, 1918, Pte Mincher was admitted to No. 1 New Zealand Field Ambulance with Appendicitis (acute) & placed on Dangerously III list on 20th March, 1918. He was removed from Dangerously III list on 30th March, 1918. He was admitted to Hospital at Wimereux, France on 4th April, 1918 & embarked for England on 8th April, 1918 where he was admitted to No. 2 New Zealand General Hospital at Walton with acute appendicitis. He was operated on 18th April, 1918. On 19th April, 1918 Pte Mincher was transferred to New Zealand Convalescent Hospital at Hornchurch. He was discharged on 2nd August, 1918 having spent 106 days there. He went on Leave to report to Codford, Wiltshire on 19th August, 1918.

Pte Mincher was admitted to No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital on 25th August, 1918 with pneumonia & pleurisy. He was reported Seriously III with pneumonia on 3rd September, 1918 & Still Serioulsy III – progressing fairly on 7th September, 1918. Pte Mincher was placed on

Dangerously III list on 22nd September, 1918 & then returned to Seriously III list on 25th September, 1918.

Pte Mincher was reported Still Seriously III on 7th October, 1918, then Still Seriously III – improving on 21st October, 1918 & again on 4th November, 1918. Pte Mincher was removed from Seriously III list to Dangerously III list on 10th November, 1918.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher died at 2.30 a.m. on 15th November, 1916 at No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital at Codford, Wiltshire of Pneumonia.

A death for Oswald A. Mincher, aged 29, was registered in the December quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire, England.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher was buried at St. Mary's Cemetery, Codford on 18th November, 1918 at 2.30 p.m.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher according to his Will, stated his beneficiaries as Thomas Cyril Mincher (born 1897, a younger brother) & Miriam Beryl Mincher (born 1893, a younger sister) – as noted in his Service Record File.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher, 26885 was last attached to Auckland Infantry Regiment. He had served in the Western European War Front in 1916-17-18.

Private Oswald Alan Mincher was entitled to British War Medal & Victory Medal. Pte Mincher's medals were sent to the Executor named in his Will – Mr D. H. McInnes of Waipu, Auckland. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were sent to Pte Mincher's father – Mr James Mincher of Northcote, Auckland (June, 1921 & February, 1922)
