Thomas Patrick Perwick was born on 19th August, 1889 at Balfour, New Zealand, the son of Alfred & Catherine Perwick. (His father had been born in Australia & his mother had been born in Ireland). He was a 27 year old, single, Farmer from Wendenside, New Zealand when he enlisted on 18th October, 1916 with the New Zealand Expeditionary Force. His service number was 39307 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Catherine Perwick of Balfour, New Zealand. (A death was registered in 1918 for Catherine Perwick, aged 60).

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick embarked with 22nd Reinforcements, Otago Infantry Regiment, D Company from Wellington, New Zealand on HMNZT (76) *Aparima* on 16th February, 1917. He disembarked at Devonport, England on 2nd May, 1917.

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick was marched in to Sling Army Camp, Wiltshire on 2nd May, 1917.

Pte Perwick left for France on 6th June, 1917 & was attached on strength at Etaples on 8th June, 1917. He joined his Battalion & was posted to 14th Company on 25th June, 1917.

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick was wounded in action on 3rd August, 1917 with a gunshot wound to arm & head. He was admitted to No. 3 New Zealand Field Ambulance & transferred to 11th General Hospital.

Pte Perwick embarked for England on the *Kalyan* on 5th August, 1917. He was admitted to No. 1 N.Z. General Hospital at Brockenhurst, Hampshire on 7th August, 1917.

Pte Perwick was attached to N.Z. Command Depot at Codford, Wiltshire on 5th September, 1917 & then transferred back to Sling Army Camp with the 4th Reserve Battalion, Otago Regiment on 26th October, 1917.

Pte Perwick was admitted to Military Hospital, Tidworth, Wiltshire on 12th December, 1917 & discharged to duty on 1st January, 1918.

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick was admitted to No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital, Codford on 24th January, 1918 with Influenza. He was placed on the seriously ill list on 29th January, 1918 & transferred to the dangerously ill list on 4th March, 1918.

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick died on 4th May, 1918 at No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital at Codford, Wiltshire of T. B. Lung.

A death for Thomas P. Perwick, aged 28, was registered in the June quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire, England.

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick was buried at St. Mary's New Cemetery, Codford on 7th May, 1918.

Private Thomas Patrick Perwick was entitled to British War Medal & Victory Medal as he had entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Perwick's father – Mr Alfred Perwick of Balfour, Southland (November, 1921 & February, 1922).

The CWGC lists Private Thomas Patrick Perwick, 39307, as the son of Alfred and Catherine Perwick of St. Patrick's, Balfour, Southland.

T. P. Perwick is remembered on the Balfour RSA War Memorial plaques situated on the wall of the Balfour Bowling Club/RSA building.
