

COMPTON BASSETT is a small parish and rural village 4 miles north-east by road, and 2.5 by footpath from Calne terminal station on a branch of the Great Western railway, 8 south from Wootton Bassett and 85 from London, in the North Western division of the county, Calne hundred, union, county court district and petty sessional division, rural deanery of Avebury, (Avebury portion), arch-deaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St Swithin is an edifice in the Norman and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, nave of 4 bays, aisles, north porch, and an embattled western tower containing 5 bells: there is a rich Tudor rood screen: the chancel was rebuilt in 1866, and a stained window inserted, in memory of Rev William Dalby, a former rector, and there are seven others: the church affords sittings for 250 persons. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £261, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1915, by the Rev Lawrence William Greenstreet BA of Worcester College, Oxford. Compton House is a mansion of stone, erected in the latter half of the 17th century: it has extensive park and pleasure grounds, and is the property of Major Godfrey C Walker-Heneage, MVO, lord of the manor and principal landowner, and the residence of Lt Col Alfred Western Hatchell Hornsby-Drake. The soil is chalky, sub-soil chalk; the chief crops are wheat, barley and turnips: the area is 2576 acres, assessable value, £2859: the population in 1911 was 298 in the civil, and 323 in the ecclesiastical parish.

By Local Government Board Order 14451, dated March 25th 1883, Cowitch Farm and cottages were transferred to Hilmarton for civil purposes.

Sexton: Francis Edward Billett

Post Office: Charles White, sub-postmaster. Letters arrive through Calne and are delivered 7.25am & 6pm, weekdays only; dispatched at 8.25am & 6.55pm. Hilmarton is the nearest money order and Calne, 4 miles distant, the nearest telegraph office. Pillar Letter Box: Compton House, cleared at 8.40am & 7.10pm, weekdays only
