

## Kelly's Directory Extract 1889 Compton Chamberlayne



**Compton Chamberlayne** is a parish and village, bounded on the north by the river Nadder, 6 miles west-by-south from Wilton, 9 west from Salisbury and 3 south-east from Dinton station on the South Western Railway, in the Southern division of the county, South Damerham hundred, Wilton Union, Salisbury county court district, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, rural deanery of Chalke and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese.

The church of St Michael is a stone edifice, close to the manor house, containing remains of Norman and Early English architecture: its general style is that of the late Decorated period, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and small square tower: it has been very well restored with an addition of 3 bells, making a peal of 6; the chancel contains a tablet in white marble to the memory of the Penruddocke family, who have been interred here since 1598, one of whom, Col. John Penruddocke, was beheaded by Cromwell's orders, 1655, for proclaiming Charles II. king: there are sittings for 150 persons.

The register dates from 1538. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £125, net £111, with residence, in the gift of Charles Penruddocke, esq., and held since 1884 by the Rev. Dudley Digges, of St Bees.

A cemetery of half an acre was formed in 1876, containing a mortuary chapel; it is under control of a Burial Board of three members.

Compton Park is the seat of Charles Penruddocke, esq., D.L., J.P., F.G.H.S. who is lord of the manor and owns the entire parish; the mansion, formerly in the style of the Henry VIII. period, has been altered to Italian, but retains some of its former style: it contains a large number of family paintings by celebrated artists, including Vandyke, Sir Antonio More, Lucas de Heere, Dobson &c.: the carving in the dining-room is by Grinling Gibbons: around is a well-wooded and extensive park, part of which has been a deer-park since A.D. 1100 and now contains about 300 head; there are also two large sheets of water, on which are constantly found quantities of wild fowl.

The soil is clay, chalk, and green sand; subsoil, the same. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 1,866 acres; rateable value, £1,930; the population in 1881 was 298.
