In the Name of God Amen I Humphrey Tugwell of the Parish of Diteridge in the County of Wilts Gentleman do make and declare this to be my last Will and Testament in manner following that is to say I give and bequeath to my dear Wife Jane the daughter of Mrs Sarah Harding of South Stoke Widow all my household furniture Goods plate linen china and all other things that may be in or about the dwelling house I reside in at the time of my decease I give and bequeath unto the said Mrs Sarah Harding all such sum and sums of money (and the interest thereof) that she may owe me at the time of my decease I give and bequeath unto Sarah Harding and Elizabeth Timbrell Andrews daughter of the said Sarah Harding the sum of one hundred pounds each free from the control of any husband either of them may be married to at the time of my decease the same to be paid them within twelve months next after my decease I give and bequeath unto Mr Daniel Harding (one of my Trustees herein after named) the sum of one hundred pounds the same to be retained by him out of

the first monies which may come to his hands as such Trustee I give and bequeath unto Mary Ann Harding the sum of one hundred pounds part of a sum of four hundred pounds that she now owes me provided she will give to my trustees hereinafter named a bond for the remaining three hundred pounds the condition for which bond it is my will shall be that the said Mary Ann Harding shall not be called upon by my said Trustees for the payment of any part of the said three hundred pounds within the term of two years next after my decease and not then for the greater sum of fifty pounds in any one year next after the expiration of the said two years I give and bequeath unto the said Sarah Harding and Jane Butler the fifty pounds which I some time lent them in lieu of the cloaths of my late dear Wife which I promised them which cloaths I give to my present Wife Jane the daughter of the said Mrs Sarah Harding and all the rest and residue of my property of whatsoever nature or kind soever either Real or Personal that I may die possessed of or interested in or that may hereafter devolve to me upon any contingency whatsoever I give devise and bequeath the same and every part thereof unto my dear Wife Jane the daughter of the said Mrs Sarah Harding And it is my will that my remains may be interred in the Vault lately made at Diteridge aforesaid And I hereby appoint Mr Harry Wilson of the City of Bath linen draper and the said Daniel Harding to be my Trustees In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty eighth day of July 1821 **Humphvey Tugwell**
