## **ANZAC DAY**



Monday next will be the sixth anniversary of the landing at Gallipoli, and as in previous years, Bristolians will join in the pilgrimage to the graves of those who lie at rest here in the old city. "Anzac Day" in Australia is one of the most impressive of ceremonial days; from one end of the Dominion to the other it is \_\_\_\_ apart as a public holiday, and in the \_\_\_ centres of population imposing demonstrations of ex-Service men take place. Australia and New Zealand are proud of the glorious war in which their sons faced the great ordeal at Gallipoli; it was their baptism of fire, such a baptism as soldiers of any nation have rarely been called upon to endure. A great many Australians died of wounds or sickness in this country. There is a graveyard in \_\_\_\_ where 352 Australians and 147 New Zealanders are at rest. At Tidworth, Salisbury Plain, \_\_\_ are buried, and at Durrington and Sutton Veny there are great numbers of Anzacs lying side by side with past generations of Wiltshire \_\_\_\_. In Bristol there are but twenty graves of Anzacs and they are nearly all at Arno's Vale Cemetery. One at least lies at Greenbank \_\_\_\_ was the first to pass away in Bristol, and the funeral was memorable for the widespread sympathy that was shown.

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
