BEERHOUSE KEEPER SUMMONED

William Herbert Toomer, a beerhouse keeper, at Durrington, was summoned for having had his house open and sold beer therein during prohibited hours on the afternoon of Sunday, the 9th of February. Mr. E. F. Kelsey appeared for the defendant, and in the absence of some witnesses he wished to call, applied for a remand. The case was accordingly adjourned for a week. **Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 21 March 1868**

William Herbert Toomer, a beerhouse keeper, at Durrington, was summoned by Mr. Matthews, Superintendent of county police, for having on the afternoon of Sunday, the 9th February, had his house open for the sale of beer and cider between the hours of three and five o'clock. The case was dismissed. **Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 28 March 1868**

William Herbert Toomer, a beerhouse keeper, at Durrington, was charged with selling beer at half-past ten o'clock on Saturday night. He was fined 40s. and costs. **Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 22 August 1868**

William Herbert Toomer, a beerhouse keeper, at Durrington, was charged with permitting drunkenness in his house. The case was proved by Sergeant Daniels and the defendant was fined 40s. and costs. The defendant was told by the Earl of Radnor that he would have to pay not less than £5 for a second offence; and for a third he would have to pay £20 and be disqualified from selling beer by retail for two years. **Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 16 March 1872**
