Clarence Floyd FENNER

Clarence Floyd Fenner was born at Richmond, Tasmania in 1895, to parents George and Hannah Fenner. He was a 21 year old, single, Labourer from Richmond, Tasmania when he enlisted on 2nd October, 1916 with the 40th Battalion of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 2567 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his father – George Fenner of Richmond, Tasmania.

Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Ulysses (A38)* on 25th October, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 28th December, 1916. Pte Fenner had been admitted to Ship's Hospital on the journey to England for 3 days from 14th November, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner was marched in to 10th Training Battalion at Durrington, Wiltshire on 28th December, 1916.

Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 10th January, 1917 – seriously ill.

Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner died at 7.30 a.m. on 14th January, 1917 at Fargo Military Hospital of pneumonia.

A death for Clarence F. Fenner, aged 20, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner was buried on 16th January, 1917 in Durrington Cemetery, Wilthsire – plot number 154.

A War Pension was granted to Hannah Fenner – mother of late Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner, in the sum of 20/- per fortnight from 19th March, 1917.

Private C. F. Fenner is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 132.

C. Fenner is also remembered on the St. Lukes Richmond Roll of Honour located inside St. Luke the Physician Anglican Church – Edward, Tomans & Church Streets.



Pte Clarence Floyd Fenner was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Fenner's father – Mr G. Fenner, Richmond, Tasmania (December, 1921 & July, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Clarence Floyd Fenner – service number 2567 as being 22 years old & served with 40th Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of George and Hannah Fenner. Born at Richmond, Tasmania.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
