Frederick BREMER

Frederick Bremer was born at Riga, Russia in 1884.

F. Bremer was listed as Crew – Able Seaman, aged 26, born Russia on S. S. *Age* arriving in Sydney, New South Wales on 29th May, 1911 which had departed from the port of Edithburgh, South Australia.

F. Bremer was listed as Crew – Able Seaman, aged 26, born Russia on S. S. *Age* arriving in Sydney, New South Wales on 27th August, 1911 which had departed from the port of Port Pirie, South Australia.

Frederick Bremer was a 31 year old, single, Labourer from Narrabri, NSW when he enlisted at Narrabri on 1st March, 1916 with the 33rd Infantry Battalion, 1st Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 1520 & his religion was Lutheran. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Jane Bremer of Burkeck, Sweiple via Riga, Russia.

Pte Frederick Bremer embarked from Sydney on HMAT *Marathon (A74)* on 4th May, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 9th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. These were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte Bremer was marched in to 9th Training Battalion at Larkhill from Australia on 21st July, 1916.

Pte Bremer was admitted to Hospital at Fargo Hospital, Wiltshire on 30th July, 1916 with Pyrexia (Fever).

Pte Frederick Bremer died on 2nd August, 1916 of Pneumonia at Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire.

A death for Fred Brenner, aged 32, was registered in the September quarter, 1916 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Pte Frederick Bremer was buried at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire in Plot number 97.

Private F. Bremer is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 121.

* Pte Frederick Bremer's file was marked "Stated to be Fritz Richard Bember – 20/9/1920"

Pte Frederick Bremer was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Bremer's mother – Mrs J. Bember "To be returned to England for issue " (May, 1922 & July, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Frederick Bremer – service number 1520 as being 31 years old & served with 33rd Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of Fritz and Julia Jane Bremer of Bunkeek, Russia. Born at Burtneek, Latvia.

A War Pension was claimed for by Juhle Bember, Wolmar Livonia, Russia –widowed mother of late Pte Bremer – result of the claim "Claimant cannot now be communicated with" dated 14th May, 1918.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government. *(Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)*

Pte F. Bremer does have a personal inscription on his headstone.
