James Henry Harper

James Henry Harper was born around 1876 at Stawell, Victoria to parents Henry John & Jemima Harper (nee Mathie). James Henry Harper married Hannah Homfray in 1903 in Victoria.

James Henry Harper was a 39 year old, married Butcher from Horsham, Victoria when he enlisted on 3rd April, 1916 with the 10th Infantry Brigade, 39th Infantry Battalion "B" Company of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 477 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs Hannah N. Harper of Dimboola Road, Horsham, Victoria. James had served 3 years with the Victorian Rangers – it was eventually disbanded in his district).

Pte James Henry Harper embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Ascanius (119)* on 27th May, 1916 & disembarked at Devonport, England on 18th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte James Henry Harper was written up for being Absent without Leave from Tattoo Roll Call at Larkhill, Wiltshire on 23rd July, 1916. This was admonished.

Pte James Henry Harper was admitted to Military Hospital at Tidworth, Wiltshire seriously ill on 28th August, 1916.

A telegram was sent to Mrs H. N. Harper on 8th September, 1916 advising that her husband Pte James H. Harper was seriously ill with pneumonia.

Pte James Henry Harper died on 13th September, 1916 from Empyaema*. (*some reports held in the Service record file state cause of death as pneumonia).

A death for John H. Harper, aged 40, was registered in the September quarter, 1916 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Pte James Henry Harper was buried on 16th September, 1916 in Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – plot number 105 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Headstone.

Private J. H. Harper is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 131.

Pte J. H. Harper was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Harper's widow – Mrs H. N. Harper (February, 1922 & July, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private James Henry Harper – service number 477 as being 39 years old & served with 39th Battalion Australian Infantry. No family details are listed.

A War Pension was granted to Hannah Norah Harper, widow of the late Pte James Henry Harper, in the sum of £2 per fortnight from 26th November, 1916. War Pensions were granted for the children of Pte James Harper:

- Jemima Ann Harper £1 per fortnight from 26th November, 1916
- Henry James Harper 15/- per fortnight from 26th November, 1916
- William John Harper 10/- per fortnight from 26th November, 1916
- Lily Margerita Harper 10/- per fortnight from 26th November, 1916
- Lawrence Hugh Harper 10/- per fortnight from 26th November, 1916
- Arthur Stanley Harper 10/- per fortnight from 26th November, 1916
- Cecilia May Harper 10/- per fortnight from 26th November, 1916

OUR SOLDIERS

News was received by Mr J. J. Gibson yesterday that his nephew Private James H. Harper had died of illness somewhere in France. Private Harper who enlisted from Horsham was a native of Rupanyup and leaves a widow and young family of eight.

NEWS AND NOTES - DIED ON SERVICE

Word was received in Horsham on Wednesday to the effect that Private James Henry Harper, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Harper, of Horsham, had died of illness in England. Death occurred on September 13, the cause being pneumonia. The deceased, who was a strong, healthy man, had worked in his father's business up to the time of his enlistment, and left with reinforcements on May 28. He was 40 years of age, and married. He leaves a widow and eight young children, the youngest two months old, for whom, with the parents, the deepest sympathy is felt.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones


The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

A letter from Base Records, dated 15th July, 1921, to Mrs H. N. Harper advises that a letter from the Defence Dept. concerning an inscription of the late Pte J. H. Harper's headstone had not been answered & non-receipt of a reply within 21 days would have to be accepted as indicating that no further action was to be taken.

Pte J. H. Harper does not have a personal inscription on his headstone.
