

Durrington is a parish and village on the river Avon, in the southern division of the county, Amesbury hundred and union, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Amesbury, 2 miles north from Amesbury, and 10 north from Salisbury.

The church of All Saints consists of chancel, nave, and aisles; the south aisle is Norman; the church was rebuilt in 1851, with the exception of the tower, which is Perpendicular; the remainder is in the Early English style; a Norman arcade has been retained: there are four beautiful memorial windows to the late incumbent, the Rev R. Webb, M.A. The register dates from 1591. The living is a rectory, yearly value about £300, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Winchester, and held by the Rev. Charles S. Ruddle T.A., of King's College, London.

There is a National school, partly supported by voluntary contributions. Allen's charity is 20s. yearly.

On the Downs are many barrows, among which is Knighton Long Barrow. To the south is the great British station called Durrington Walls.

The manor is held by the Warden and Fellows of Winchester College, and the East End manor is held by the trustees of Sir E. Poore, bart., and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. The principal landowners are Thomas E. Fowle, esq., and George Pearce Moore, esq.

The soil is light and chalky; subsoil, chalk; the chief crops are wheat, barley and oats; the area is 2,682 acres; gross estimated rental £3,116; rateable value £2,885; in 1871 the population was 420.

KNIGHTON is half a mile north-west.
