Reginald Dietrich YEAMAN

Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was born at Carlton, Melbourne, Victoria in 1894 to parents Alfred and Lilian Gertrude Yeaman (nee Dietrich). He was a 22 year old, single, Farrier from Toorak, Victoria when he enlisted on 7th March, 1916 with the 8th Field Artillery Brigade, 32nd Battery of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 20196 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his aunt – Mrs A. Dietrich of 68 Mathoura Road, Toorak, Victoria (Parents both deceased).

Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was given the position of Gunner with the Field Artillery Brigade & was promoted to Driver on 12th May, 1916.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Medic (A7)* on 20th May, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 18th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was sent to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 6th August, 1916 & discharged on 16th August, 1916.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was taken on strength with 8th Field Artillery Battalion on 13th September, 1916.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 9th October, 1916. He was transferred to Tidworth Military Hospital for Observation on 14th October, 1916 & reported seriously ill on 16th October, 1916. Driver Yeaman's aunt was notified that her nephew was dangerously ill with Cerebro spinal meningitis on 25th October, 1916. Driver Yeaman's aunt was notified that her nephew's condition was reported as stationary on 1st November, 1916 & again on 27th November, 1916.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman died at 12 p.m. on 19th December, 1916 at Lucknow Isolation Hospital, Tidworth, Wiltshire from Cerebro Spinal Fever (Cerebro Spinal Meningitis).

A death for Reginald D. Yeaman, aged 23, was registered in the December quarter, 1916 in the district of Pewsey, Wiltshire.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was buried on 22nd December, 1916 at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – Plot number 132 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

The Red Cross Wounded & Missing File for Driver R. D. Yeaman had a request from the Red Cross, on behalf of his relatives regarding the suffering, death & burial. Several replies were made:

- "Admitted to Fargo Military Hospital 9-10-16. Transferred to Tidworth 14-10-16. Suffering from a severe attack of Cerebro-Spinal Fever. At present he is better but there are still reasons for fair anxiety. Is a patient in our Lucknow Isolation Hospital. Regret to inform you that he is still in a very critical condition, suffering from Cerebro-Spinal Fever."
- From the Officer in Charge Tidworth Military Hospital "I have to inform you that several British relatives of this man visited him during his illness and they also attended the funeral. The Matron

has already written to his relatives in Australia, and had given them full particulars concerning his illness and funeral."

Driver R. D. Yeaman is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 19.

Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Yeaman's aunt – Mrs A. Dietrich (both sent October, 1922) A letter to Base Records, dated 27th September, 1922, from the only sibling of the late Driver Yeaman – Vera Spain, same address as their aunt, stated she had no objection to her aunt, Miss Alice Dietrich, receiving her brother's War Medals etc. as she had been named next-of-kin.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Driver Reginald Dietrich Yeaman – service number 20196 as being 21 years old & served with 108th Howitzer Bty, Australian Field Artillery. He was the son of Alfred and Lilian Gertrude Yeaman. Born in Victoria.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government. (Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)

Driver R. D. Yeaman does have a personal inscription on his headstone.

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
