David BRODERICK

David Broderick was born around 1873.

Serjeant David Broderick died on 28th July, 1918.

A death for David Broderick, aged 45, was registered in the September quarter, 1918 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire, England.

Serjeant David Broderick was buried in Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire in Grave /Plot Number 291 on 31st July, 1918. His death is acknowledged by Commonwealth War Graves Commission & as such he has a CWGC headstone but he does not have a personal inscription on his headstone.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Serjeant D. Broderick 5133, as being attached to Royal Irish Regiment. No additional family information is listed.

Royal Irish Regiments located in Wiltshire

3rd Battalion, Royal Irish Regiment

The 3rd Battalion, Royal Irish Regiment was a Reserve Battalion & was raised in Clonmel in August, 1914. The Battalion was a training Unit & it remained in the UK throughout the War. It moved within a few days of declaration of war to Dublin. In September, 1916, the battalion moved to Templemore (Co. Tipperart) but by the end of 1917 was back at Dublin. In April, 1918 the Battalion moved to England and joined the Irish Reserve Brigade at Larkhill, near Durrington, Wiltshire.

4th Battalion, Royal Irish Regiment

The 4th Battalion, Royal Irish Regiment was an Extra Reserve Battalion & was raised in Kilkenny in August, 1914. The Battalion was a training Unit & it remained in the UK throughout the War. It moved within a few days of declaration of war to Queenstown. In May, 1915 the Battalion moved to England & was based at Gosport. They returned to Ireland in September, 1915 and moved to Fernmoy. In May, 1916, the battalion moved to back to Queenstown. In April, 1918 the Battalion moved to England and joined the Irish Reserve Brigade at Larkhill, near Durrington, Wiltshire.
