#### William Razey ROBINSON

William Razey Robinson was born at Tallana Station, New South Wales in 1881 to parents Samuel & Elizabeth Jane Robinson (nee Allen).

William Razey Robinson married Amy Ann Jefferies in Perth, Western Australia in 1903. Newspaper Notice – The West Australian, Perth – Wednesday 16th September, 1903:

ROBINSON-JEFFERIES – At the Cathedral, by Dean Goldsmith, on June 15, 1903, William Razey Robinson, Canning Mills, to Amy Ann Jeffries, second daughter of William Jeffries, Albany. Adelaide and Albany papers please copy.

William Razey Robinson was a 34 year old, married, Farmer from Manjimup, Western Australia when he enlisted on 2<sup>nd</sup> June, 1916 with the 11<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade, 43<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Battalion, 4<sup>th</sup> Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 2388 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs Amy Ann Robinson of Manjimup, W.A. (Later c/- Mrs G. H. Corboy of 22 Woolwich Street, Leederville, Western Australia).

Pte William Razey Robinson embarked from Fremantle on HMAT *Port Melbourne (A16)* on 30<sup>th</sup> October, 1916 & disembarked at Devonport, England on 28<sup>th</sup> December, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte William Razey Robinson was marched in to 11<sup>th</sup> Training Battalion, Durrington, Wiltshire on 29<sup>th</sup> December, 1916.

Pte William Razey Robinson was sent sick to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 4<sup>th</sup> February, 1917. He was reported with severe pneumonia on 5<sup>th</sup> February, 1917. Mrs A. A. Robinson was advised of her husband's illness.

Private William Razey Robinson died at 4.30 p.m. on 7<sup>th</sup> February, 1917 at Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire from Pneumonia. Pte William Razey Robinson was one of six soldiers to die in a period of 24 hours - all related to pneumonia, influenza & bronchitis.

A death for William R. Robinson, aged 36, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Private William Razey Robinson was buried on 13<sup>th</sup> February, 1917 at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – Plot number 185 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

Private W. R. Robinson is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 137.

Pte William Razey Robinson was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Robinson's widow – Mrs A. A. Robinson (sent December, 1921 & July, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private William <u>Rayey</u> Robinson – service number 2388 as being <u>27</u> years old & served with 43rd Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of Samuel and Elizabeth Jane Robinson; husband of Amy Ann Robinson of Gregory Street, Geraldton, Western Australia. Born in New South Wales.

#### Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
