A happy New Year to everyone from the Chairman and members of the East Knoyle Parish Council.

January is the time of year when we request our Precept payment from Wilts CC. This money helps us finance the business of the Council each year and is itemised on your Council Tax bill.

At the PC meeting in December the Council voted to increase the precept for the forthcoming year to £10,225 and this will represent a change to band D Council taxpayers of £ 28.77 for the year, an increase of roughly 2.5%.

At an extraordinary general meeting held in December, the PC appointed Burfitt and Garrett to undertake the dismantling and rebuilding of the dangerous section of Knoyle House Ground Wall. Work will start and be completed while the road is closed during the Wessex Water mains replacement currently underway. Many thanks to Ian Tait and his team for their work on pulling this project together in very quick time.

The KHG wall repair project will be the Parish Council's single most expensive item of cost ever and will place a huge burden on PC finances. We are in the process of applying for funding for the project and will be delighted to hear from anyone who would like to make a contribution to the restoration of this significant and historic part of the village. The annual litter pick is planned to take place on Sat 29th Feb and will start at 10am at Wren's Shop.

Please let the Clerk know if you plan to volunteer as this really helps with planning and organisation and means the correct amount of equipment and refuse bags can be arranged.

The Wessex Water mains replacement continues ahead of schedule and it is hoped to have Richard Mullins, the project manager, attend our 11th Feb meeting to address any concerns residents may have.

The PC still has one vacancy and interested parties should contact the Clerk to find out more about what is involved.



#### **Round and About**

Very many congratulations to Diana Makgill who has just celebrated her 90<sup>th</sup> birthday. Despite a career which often meant living in other places, Diana has been associated with the village since she was a small child, and remembers going to church at the age of about 4, under the very watchful eye of Lady Pembroke of Knoyle House. Her family are spread far and wide, though came to celebrate with her on her birthday. Both the Royal British Legion and St Mary's were delighted to be able to mark the occasion appropriately.

Lizzie Wilsey is moving away from the village and takes with her the good wishes of her many friends here.

Sadly, we record the death of Michael Bryer Ash, who spent many years living in Upton, firstly at Upton Farm and then at Upton Courtyard. Michael was Master of the Fuellers Company in the City of London, a governor of Godolphin School in Salisbury and a generous supporter of St Mary's and other village organisations. Latterly Michael had lived in Newtown and then south of Salisbury. His funeral in St Mary's was very well attended.

Long-established residents will remember the days when the telephone exchange next door to the old school really was the hub of village communications - long before the two green boxes were positioned at the crossroads. It took some skill to keep all the plugs in the right places so we could all talk to each other and people outside the village. The last engineer who was able to manage that exchange was Gordon Neale who lived in Gillingham, and who was not allowed to retire while it still needed attention! Gordon died in the autumn, and Gillingham church was full for his funeral.

The funds that have been raised to undertake improvements need to be linked to grants that are available for facilities like the Village Hall. A huge amount of work has been undertaken by Paul Eggington in making grant applications for these improvements and has been successful in receiving a National Lottery Community Grant which will be used to upgrade the electrical board and replace the boiler. Plans for upgrading the toilets have been drawn up and are out to tender with the inclusion of a disabled facility to bring the Village Hall into line with modern requirements.

With Moviola being such a regular user of the hall the chairs are an ever present discussion point to the extent that some possible customers do not go to Moviola. There is a search for a suitable system of chairs that will not be so testing for the user and then put the existing chairs up for sale. The second aspect for Moviola is the acoustics which do not make listening very easy in some parts of the hall, so we are going to look into how they can be improved.

#### American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins (Corsair Press 2020) £14.99 Reviewed by Jonathan Stones



'A Grapes of Wrath for our times' froths the back cover. No, it isn't. But it is a truly remarkable work of fiction; totally enthralling and viscerally exciting. It challenges conventional perspectives in concerning itself with the fate of the Central and South American migrant (the 'American Dirt' of the title), principally through the characters of a young Mexican woman, Lydia, and her eight year old son Luca, escaping from a notoriously violent narcotics cartel which has murdered sixteen members of their family in their home in Acapulco, following a newspaper expose of the gang by Lydia's journalist husband. We are spared the full horrors of the

actual murder spree because our concentration is immediately centred on Lydia and Luca as they hide desperately behind a half-concealing shower wall in the house while the rest of the family is being gunned down in the yard outside.

We are then frantically on the run with mother and son as the unintended survivors flee the cartel. Lydia's plan is to find relatives living in Colorado, more than a thousand miles away. At first she makes progress by local buses, but soon realises that the narcos have road blocks everywhere. She and Luca are smuggled by private minibus to the airport in Mexico City where she tries to buy tickets for herself and Luca but is refused when she is unable to produce his birth certificate. At this point, Lydia and Luca have no alternative if they are to escape; they have to become 'illegals': 'All her life she's pitied these poor people. She's wondered with the sort of detached fascination of the comfortable elite... that they would leave their homes, their cultures, their families, their languages, and venture into tremendous peril, risking their very lives, all for the chance to get to the dream of some faraway country that doesn't even want them'. Now she has no choice; she and Luca will have to flee on top of the nightmarish 'La Bestia': the freight trains the migrants ride across the length of the country.

The journey is a mission of terror, and tragedy awaits. Violence and kidnappings are endemic along the tracks and apart from the criminal dangers, migrants are maimed and killed every day when they fall from the tops of the trains; only the poorest and most desperate of people attempt to travel this way. Lydia must also make contact with a coyote, one of the migrant traffickers, who for extortionate sums undertake to smuggle migrants across the border, where in turn they are met by border patrols, and worse, vigilantes who treat the rounding up and murder of migrants as a blood-sport.

Whether both Lydia and Luca (an increasingly remarkable character in his own right) succeed against all odds in finding safety must be left for readers to discover for themselves; what is almost certain is that by the end of the compelling narrative, few will remain unaffected by this vivid and challenging work.



#### East Knoyle Rainfall Robin Egerton

November 108.50mm (4.27")



December 143.50mm (5.65")

November's rainfall was over an inch lower than October and stopped the rising trend established by the last two months. In November, I recorded rain on 19 different days, and there was only one 4 day spell without rain just after the middle of the month, no rain was recorded on the last two days and there were 5 single days without rain interspersed through the first half of the month. The November average rainfall for the last 25 years is 110.92mm (4.37"), so this November is just below the average.

December picked up the September and October increasing trend and became the wettest month of the year. In December, I recorded rain again on 19 different days. The twelve days without rain were the first 5 days and the last 3 days of the month, the remaining 4 single days were spread through the middle part of the month.

The December average rainfall is 96.78mm (3.81"), so this December's rainfall is well above the average. This seems a lot, but it was only the 13th wettest December over the last 25 years. Thus this last year 2019, had a total rainfall of 925.75mm 36.44".

Indeed over the last 25 years there were 14 wetter years and therefore 11 drier years. These figures give me another Years Records, so that for 2020 I can now draw on 26 years records for average rainfall. Not nearly enough to establish any real 'TRENDS OR PATTERNS.'

#### Keeping out of hospitals (keep warm, get jabbed)

Regular readers of my articles will recognise the theme where I ask you to help us look after you better. This phrase has been taken by the whole NHS to headline a series of health campaigns that started a few weeks ago starting with antibiotics (don't expect them for acute

viral illness – they don't work, cause side effects and increase drug resistance making them less effective for you and others when they really are needed). This month I am extending the scope to ask for your help to avoid having to go to hospital.

We are fortunate in having a local hospital in Salisbury where our patients regularly report back excellent care, but also how busy it is. This is an alarming pattern across the NHS where hospitals report winter levels of activity in the summer and trolleys lining up in corridors never previously used. The BMA reports that the whole system is at breaking point and are predicting a very cold winter and the 'flu outbreak in Australia, which we mirror, was the worst for many years.

Turning off the demand for the hospital care is rarely mentioned but you can help with this. We get told we need 10,000 more beds and thousands more staff and brand new hospitals. This is despite a ten-fold increase in consultant numbers in the past 40 years from 5,500 to 55,000. GP numbers have been static at 34,000 (and falling) with their share of NHS funding going from 12% in 2005 to 8%. This systematic disinvestment in general practice by successive governments is why many parts of England have to wait weeks to see almost non-existent GPs and contributes to hospitals being overwhelmed. Patients who can't be looked after in general practice have less effective preventative care (get ill more often) and when unwell have to go elsewhere - often the hospital. This doesn't happen in our part of Wiltshire because all the local practices will see you quickly and provide good planned care.

You can minimise your risk of a winter emergency by staying warm and have a 'flu jab (the two most effective preventative interventions). Despite vaccinating a thousand patients we still have some at increased risk of 'flu not yet jabbed and we still have the jabs in stock. If you haven't had a jab or now decide you want one – please get in touch and reduce your risk of getting 'flu advice.

Look out for your neighbours. Each year we have one or two admissions of elderly patients who have fallen and become hypothermic. This part of Wiltshire sees no seasonal increase in care sensitive conditions that suggests everyone is doing all of the above already. Many thanks for this and we wish everyone all the very best over the festive season and for next year.

#### **Managing Insomnia**

Once again we are asking our patients to help us. This time it is to improve our management of insomnia (poor sleep). In the last three months we issued over 250 prescriptions to over 90 patients for sleeping tablets and we are the highest prescribers in Wiltshire despite being low prescribers for all medicines.

NICE has guidance about the management of insomnia and the safe use of sleeping tablets. They do have a role, but should only be used for a maximum of a single prescription for two weeks when other measures have failed. In future when someone sees us about problems with sleeping we will recommend sleep hygiene, referral to IAPT (clinical psychology service that you can self-refer to by calling 01722 820267) for CBT (cognitive behavioural therapy) and mindfulness. All of these are more effective measures, especially long-term. It is common to sleep poorly after a distressing event or bereavement but this is a normal process that it is usually better to work through without medication.

There is an excellent book called "Overcoming Insomnia" by Colin Espie, a clinical psychologist who runs a sleep service in Glasgow. Buying this, reading it and acting on his advice may be your best investment in 2020. He writes about **Sleep Hygiene** which aims to make people more aware of behavioural, environmental, and temporal factors that may be detrimental or beneficial to sleep by:

- Establish fixed times for going to bed and waking up (and avoid sleeping in after a poor night's sleep).
- Try to relax before going to bed.
- Maintain a comfortable sleeping environment: not too hot, cold, noisy, or bright.
- Avoid napping during the day.
- Avoid caffeine, nicotine, and alcohol within 6 hours of going to bed.
- Consider complete elimination of caffeine from the diet.
- Avoid exercise within 4 hours of bedtime (although exercise earlier in the day is beneficial).
- Avoid eating a heavy meal late at night.
- Avoid watching or checking the clock throughout the night.
- Only use the bedroom for sleep and sexual activity.

There is a lot of information on the web on CBT and mindfulness.

In 2020 we will be having more training on ways we can help patients on regular sleeping tablets (and opiates) to reduce their use.

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
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
