

Kellys Directory Extract 1915 Edington



EDINGTON is a parish and village with a station, 91.5 miles from London, on the London and Weymouth line, on the road from Westbury to Devizes, 3.75 miles east from Westbury station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, and 6 south-east from Trowbridge, in the Western division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Whorwellsdown, Westbury and Whorwellsdown union, Westbury county court district, Potterne rural deanery, (Potterne portion), archdeaconry of Wilts, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St Mary, St Katherine, and All Saints, erected by William Edyngdon in 1361, and considered to be the only perfect monastic church remaining in the county, is a cruciform edifice of stone, in the Transition style, from Decorated to Perpendicular, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave, transepts, south porch with parvise, and a fine embattled tower, rising from the intersection, containing 6 bells: among the monuments is one of the 17th century to Sir Edward Lewys; in the south transept is an ancient tomb, with the effigy of a monk, and a monument with figures, by Sir F Chantrey, to Sir Simon R B Taylor bart (d. 1815): there is a window containing glass of the 14th century: the windows of the north aisle also retain a great deal of the original stained glass: a piscine and rood screen still exist: the church was restored 1889-1891, at a cost of about £7000 and affords about 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1695. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £150, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1910 by the Rev Ernest Christian Alexander MA of Caius College, Cambridge. There is a Weslyan chapel at Tinhead, erected in 1828. William of Edyngdon, a native of this place, reached the dignities of Bishop of Winchester, Lord Treasurer, and Chancellor of England, in the reign of Edward III, and founded here in 1358, at the instance of the Black Prince, a monastery of Bonhommes of the Augustine order, of which nothing remains but the present parish church; the manor anciently belonged to the Abbey of Romsey, and on the dissolution of monasteries, the land was granted to Thomas Lord Seymour of Sudeley, and subsequently, to William Paulet, 1st Marquess of Winchester. George Simon Arthur Watson-Taylor esq is lord of the manor, and Percy Peplar esq, the principal landowner. The soil is green sand, subsoil chalk with some clay. The chief crop is wheat and some land is in pasture, and there are numerous apple orchards. The area is 5765 acres; rateable value £6912; the population In 1911 was 726, including its adjuncts.

West Coulston tithing is 2 miles east, Tinhead tithing, half a mile east; Baynton is 1.5 miles north-east.
