

A BURGLARY

One Hundred and Sixty Pounds Reward

WHITEHALL, Feb. 28, 1801.

WHEREAS it hath been humbly represented to the King, that on Saturday the 15th, or early on Sunday morning the 16th of November last, the **CROWN INN**, in Everly, Wilts, then occupied by Thomas Smith, and now by Thomas Mundy, was burglariously BROKEN OPEN, by some person or persons unknown, and ROBBED of Cash and Notes to the amount of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS and upwards, and also the following Plate, viz. – One large soup ladle, cipher unknown; twelve table spoons, six of which are marked S.; five table spoons, H.D.; one ditto, T.S.; two pair of sugar tongs, ?; one plain ditto, and one M.T.; and two table spoons with no mark, - the property of the said Thomas Smith.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the above burglary and felony, is hereby pleased to promise his most GRACIOUS PARDON to any one of them who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
