

## Post Office Directory Extract 1855 Figheldean



Figheldean is a village 4 miles north of Amesbury and 12 from Salisbury north-west, in the Hundred and Union of Amesbury and diocese of Salisbury, on the river Avon. The living is a vicarage, value £182 10s in the gift of the bishop of the diocese; the Rev Henry Caswell is the incumbent. The church, situated in a picturesque spot, is a very ancient structure, supposed to have been built early in the reign of Stephen. It consists of a chancel, in which are several monuments of the Poore family, a nave, aisles, square tower, an organ and 3 bells. It contains two ancient statues of Crusaders, discovered in a field near the adjoining village of Milston. Here is a parish school, with 68 pupils. In 1851 the population was 527; the acreage 5,279. E D Poore Esq is lord of the manor.

Ablington, is half a mile south-east; Alton, a quarter of a mile south; Syrencot 1 mile south. Choulston is a farm.
