Fovant

1846 – Mr James Sanger

Another inquest was also held by Mr Wilson on the same day (*Friday*), at Fovant, on the body of Mr James Sanger, a carter in the employ of Mr William Futcher. The deceased had been to Salisbury with a wagon and three horses, accompanied by two of his sons, and on his return, after passing through Barford, had got up into the wagon to ride, feeling tired, and being troubled with bad feet, leaving his elder son to walk by the side of the horses, when, from some unknown cause, they ran away, and the lad, not being able to control them, the deceased, in his endeavour to get out of the wagon, fell, and both the near wheels passed over his neck, killing him instantaneously. He has left a widow and six young children, and was a steady and trustworthy servant. Verdict, Accidental death.
