

ACCIDENTS - 1800-1899

1866

On Monday a man named Bowles, while faggoting in Grovely Wood, had the misfortune to cut the back of his hand so as to render it doubtful whether he will ever regain the use of it. He was taken to the Salisbury Infirmary, where every attention was given to the case.

1869

A young man named William Cannings, in the employ of Mr. Edwards, of this place, fell from a load of hay, on Saturday last, and broke his jaw. He was taken to the Salisbury Infirmary immediately, and is progressing favourably. Salisbury Times, Saturday, 19 June 1869

1870

On Wednesday, as a young man, named William Trubridge, was riding with a friend on a waggon that was going to Wylye, the horse began to kick and striking him on the right leg caused a fracture. He was conveyed to the Salisbury Infirmary. **Western Gazette, Friday, 11 March 1870**

1871

On Monday last a man named James Simper was carrying a sack of wheat in a barn belonging to Mr. Saunders, when he fell and sprained his right knee. On Wednesday he was admitted into the Salisbury Infirmary.

1873

Richard Leversuch, a labourer in the service of Mr. Andrews, of this village, was on Saturday employed loading a cart with hurdles, and when fastening the same with rope, it broke, and he was precipitated to the ground, when his left side was injured. On Monday, he was made an inpatient of the Salisbury Infirmary. Western Gazette, Friday, 4 July 1873

On Friday last, Thomas Trowbridge, a lad in the employ of Mr. Ferris, of Little Wishford, injured his left leg jumping out of a barn. On Monday, it was thought desirable to admit him into the infirmary at Salisbury. **Western Gazette, Friday, 4 July 1873**

1875

On Friday James Tutt fell from a machine when at work for Mr J. Higgins at Wishford, and injured his left thigh. Soon afterwards he was taken to the Salisbury Infirmary.
