

## Post Office Directory Extract 1875

## Ham



**Ham** is a village and parish in the Southern division of the county, Elstub hundred, Hungerford union and county court district, diocese of Salisbury, archdeaconry of Wilts and rural deanery of Marlborough, 4 miles south from Hungerford station, 4½ east from Great Bedwin station, 65 from London and 11 south-east from Marlborough, on the Berkshire border.

The church of All Saints is a small plain structure, and consists of chancel and nave, with tiled roof and square granite tower and 5 bells. The register dates from 1530. The living is a rectory, yearly value £457, with 20 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Bishop of Oxford, and held by the Rev. Charles Sumner Burder, M.A., of St Mary Hall, Oxford.

There is a handsome Parochial mixed school, with residence attached, lately rebuilt and supported by the rector and principal residents. The building is in the Early English style. This school will hold 60 children. The cost of rebuilding was £400.

The Dean and Chapter of Winchester are lords of the manor. The principal landowners are John Canning, esq., Francis Watts, esq., H D Woodman, esq., and Charles Wright, esq.

The soil is clay; subsoil, sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and swedes.

The area is 1,605 acres; gross estimated rental, £2,457; rateable value, £2,234; the population in 1871 was 255.
