1900 Thomas Brown

Was ordered to pay 5s and costs for assaulting Joseph Major at Hankerton on March 17th.

1910 Jesse Nicholls

Labourer, of Hankerton, was charged with assaulting his late employer, Jesse Kinch, farmer, on Minety Road, on February 7th. He denied the offence. The bench dismissed the charge, each to pay his own costs.

Western Daily Press Friday 4 March 1910

1920 Oliver Greenslade

Farmer, Hankerton, charged with contravening the Foot and Mouth Disease Order, 1920, by moving sheep across the highway. Fined £2.

Western Daily Press Friday 6 February 1920

Albert Edward 1932 Haves

Of Hankerton, Swindon, was summoned for having, on December 11, driven a motor-tractor without an efficient silencer; and, further, for not having the identification marks easily distinguishable. The defendant admitted the first offence, but denied the second. The bench imposed a fine of 5/- for the offence relating to an inefficient silencer.

Gloucester Citizen Friday 1 January 1932

Henry Graham 1936 Gore

Of Hankerton Priory, Malmesbury, was fined £10 and £3 8s 6d costs at Stow-onthe-Wold Police Court for driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of drink. He was also suspended from driving for the next three years. Gore, who pleaded not guilty, told the Bench that previously he had driven for 29 years without a conviction. Occasionally ha had engaged a driver when he himself was not feeling well. Sunstroke, gastritis, and three major operations were the causes of his illness. He had no drink on the day named, neither did he have any food, but a few drops of sal volatile. It was his intention not to drive a car any more, as he realised his illness had made him unfit to do so.

Western Daily Press Saturday 12 September 1936

Two boys aged 16 and 14 were fined 2s 6d for having ridden cycles at 1938 Hankerton without front lights.
