

Kellys Directory Extract 1889 Heytesbury



HEYTESBURY is a parish, formerly a market town, consisting principally of one street, situated on the banks of the river Wylye and borders of Salisbury plain, with a station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, 118 miles from London, 18 northwest from Salisbury and 4 south-east from Warminster, in the Western division of the county, hundred of its own name, Warminster union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Wylye Heytesbury portion, archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury: it was a prescriptive borough, governed by a bailiff and burgesses, and sent two members to Parliament till disfranchised by the Reform Act. The market is discontinued, but an annual fair is still held on the 14th of May. The church of SS. Peter and Paul was collegiate, and had, until recently, four prebends: it is a spacious cruciform edifice, chiefly Early English, and consists of chancel with chancel aisles, nave and aisles, north and south transepts, south entrance porch and low square central tower: the pillars of the nave, which had fallen much out of the perpendicular, have been rebuilt, and also a part of the tower, which contains a fine peal of 6 bells and a clock, and to which a new way of access has been made: some Early English arches and columns, long hidden behind the plaster of the walls in the chancel, have been opened and repaired, and the aisles which formerly existed rebuilt, and the high pitch of the original roof restored: the cost of these works considerably exceeded £6,000: there are several stained windows; one at the eastern end, the gift of Lady Heytesbury, and a memorial window in the north transept is the gift of the Hon. Mrs. Robert Daly, the daughter of the first Lord Heytesbury: the whole church has been reseated with open benches seating 450. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a vicarage, with that of Knook annexed, joint yearly value from the tithe rent-charge £106, gross £312, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1883 by the Rev. William John Swayne, M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Oxford. Here is a Congregational chapel. Here is a very ancient hospital or almshouse, founded by Lady Hungerford, for twelve poor men, one woman, and a custos, who must be in holy orders and act as chaplain. On COTLEY HILL, north-west of the town, is a tumulus, surrounded by an entrenchment, 480 feet in diameter. About a quarter of a mile north-west from Knook Castle is Bowls Barrow, and on the north bank of the Wylye, Golden Barrow. Near the town is Heytesbury House, the seat of Lord Heytesbury, M.A., D.L., J.P.; the house is a square stone building, partly rebuilt about 1784, standing in a well-wooded park of 95 acres extent containing some good specimens of lime, cedar and beech. Lord Heytesbury D.L., J.P. is lord of the manor and sole owner of the parish. The soil is partly light, partly clay; subsoil, chalk and stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 4,762 acres; rateable value, £4,344; the population in 1881 was 928.

TYTHERINGTON, about 1 mile south from Heytesbury, is a hamlet, and formerly a prebend in the collegiate church of Heytesbury. The church of St. James is a plain old stone building in the Early Decorated style, about 19 feet wide and 50 feet long, with stone covered roof and western bell cot containing one bell: the interior is fitted with open benches, and will seat about 70 people. The population and area are included with Heytesbury.
