

## Kelly's Directory Extract 1907 Hindon



Hindon is a parish, mostly comprised in one straight street, nearly a quarter of a mile in length, on a gradual acclivity, on the high road from Salisbury to Taunton, 3 ½ miles north-west from Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway, 7 miles east from Mere, 16 west of Salisbury and 7 north-by-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Downton, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), and archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. This was an ancient Parliamentary borough by prescription, and possessed a local government, having a bailiff and burgesses, and returned two members to parliament, but was disfranchised at the passing of the Reform Act in 1832.

On Holy Thursday, July 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1755, two-thirds of the town were destroyed by fire. The houses are built chiefly of stone, raised from the quarry at Tisbury, in this locality. The main street is planted on each side with trees presented by the late Sir M. Robert Shaw-Stewart bart. on the occasion of the marriage of His Majesty Edw. VII. when Prince of Wales, 10 March, 1863.

The church of St. John the Baptist, built in 1871, at the cost of Richard, late Marquess of Westminster, on the site of the old church, probably erected about 1555, is of Chilmark stone with Bath stone dressings, in the Early French Gothic style, and consists of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, vestry, and a western tower, with spire, containing a clock and 6 bells: there are three memorial windows to the late Marquess of Westminster, d. 1869: the lecturn was given in memory of J. G. and T. Hacker: the church affords 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1595. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £169, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Julian Pattisson, of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. Here are Congregational and Primitive Methodist chapels.

James Ames Esq, late of Hindon, surgeon, who died June 9<sup>th</sup>, 1828, left by will £10 annually to the poor of this parish for ever, to be distributed by the overseers in bread and clothing on Christmas Eve.

The Lamb inn is well suited for families and commercial travellers. The market formerly held on a Thursday has become obsolete, but a fair is still held on the 29<sup>th</sup> of October. The town is almost wholly the property of Lady Octavia Shaw-Stewart, of Fonthill Abbey.

The soil is light chalky loam; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, barley, Oates &c. and pasturage. The area is 212 acres; rateable value, £802; the population in 1901 was 413.
