

Kellys Directory Extract 1889 Holt



HOLT is a pleasant village, junction station on the Great Western railway, and ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1846, situated on the road from Bradford to Melksham, 21/2 miles north-east from Bradford, 3 north from Trowbridge, 3 southwest from Melksham and 103 from London by rail, in the Western division of the county, civil parish, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Bradford, rural deanery of Potterne Bradford portion, archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Catherine is an ancient stone structure, and consists of chancel, nave and aisles, with square western embattled saddle-back tower and 5 bells; there is a curious old Norman font, dating from the 12th century: the east window and one in the south aisle are stained: it has been restored and reseated with open benches, the old gallery removed, the west window restored, and a north porch built, total cost about £550, and four presentation windows inserted in the south side at a cost of £130: the porch was erected by Miss Chapman, in memory of Robert Chapman esq.: the church is now (1889) in the course of restoration, new roofs are to be put upon the nave and aisles, the nave will be made 11 feet higher, new arcades will be built, the whole floor paved with tiles, and it is hoped that a new chancel, vestry and organ chamber will be added: there are 276 sittings. The register dates from the year 1575. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1865 by the Rev. Herbert Henry Moseley, B. A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. Here is a new Congregational chapel, built in 1880, at a cost of £2,200, the old chapel being converted into a school. Woolstapling is carried on by Messrs. J. and T. Beaven. A substantial stone building was erected in 1873 for a reading room for the working classes. A coffee tavern and reading room has been opened at the expense of Miss S. Chapman, of this village. Holt Manor House stands in a small park of 16 acres and is the residence of Alexander Mackay esq. J.P. J. H. B. Forster, esq. who is lord of the manor, Michael Palmer esq. and Thomas Alexander esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is rich loam; subsoil, gravel and clay. The chief crops are wheat and pasture. The area is 1,320 acres; the population in 1881 was 936.
