The Railway at Holt and some people associated with it

The first train to run through Holt was reported in the Dorset Chronicle on Saturday 7th September 1846. The Holt line became part of the Great Western Railway in 1851. The station dates from 1861, when it became Holt Junction, a changing place of the Devizes branch. It became a station in its own right in April 1874 but it was 3 years before there was a proper approach road. Goods yards were added in 1878. The last train to stop at Holt was on 16th April 1966.

Staff were appointed to be responsible for points and signals. They were called "section policemen" and were sworn in like policemen and even shared some of the parish duties with them. Their uniforms were not dissimilar in that they wore reinforced top hats and they carried truncheons. They needed to be reliable with good eyesight and hearing and were expected to be on duty at all times, in all winds and weather.
