

Kelly's Directory Extract 1915 LEA



LEA is a pleasant village and parish 2 miles south east from Malmesbury terminal station, on a branch of the Great Western railway, in the North Western division of the county, Malmesbury hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district, and in Malmesbury rural deanery, North Wilts archdeaconry and Bristol diocese. The church of St Giles, which was an ancient fabric of stone, was rebuilt in 1880 in the Gothic style and now consists of chancel, nave of five bays, north aisle, south porch, and an embattled western tower, containing 5 bells: the church affords 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1754. The living is a vicarage, annexed to the rectory of Garsdon, net joint yearly value £271 with 61 acres of glebe with residence in the gift of Miss Hay, and held since 1892 by the Rev Reynell Wreford Hay of Christ's College, Cambridge, who resides at Garsdon, There is a Congregational chapel here and a Primitive Methodist chapel at Cleverton. Mill's charity of £6 is for distribution yearly. A small stream runs through the parish, on which is a corn mill. Capt the Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery MVO is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is sandy, sub-soil clay. The parish consists chiefly of pasture land; the area is 1773 acres of land and 5 of water; rateable value £2578; the population in 1911 was 408.

CLEVERTON (or Cleaverton) is a hamlet 1.5 m east.
