Liddington



Liddington is a township, pretty village and parish, 4 miles south-east from Swindon, and 8½ north-east from Marlborough, in the Hundred of Kingsbridge, Highworth Union, Cricklade parlimentary borough, North Wilts, and Diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

The living is a prebendal rectory, value £325, in the gift of the Duke of Marlborough. The Church of All Saints is an ancient stone Building, which was repaired about 1850; the old pews replaced with open sittings; it has a square tower with 5 bells, and an antique stone font. There is a chapel for Wesleyans.

Liddington Castle is a large intrenchment or mound, distant about 1 mile on the road to Hungerford.

The population, as returned in 1851, 434, including the hamlets.

The Duke of Marlborough is lord of the manor. The old Manor House, the residence of Mr John Brind, is an object of interest.

Coate, Medbourne, and Lidington Wick, 2 miles north-west, are places in this township, as are Moorlease and New Barn.
