

CORONERS INQUESTS



William Gatehouse

On Friday the 2nd ins. Mr. Whitmarsh held an inquest at Mere, on the body of William Gatehouse, who was found lying down on the ground, in a lane in Mere, commonly called "Dark-lane."

The deceased was in liquor at the time: and had been quarrelling with another young man at a public-house, and received a blow which felled him to the ground, but he was able to leave the inn about 10 minutes after to go home.

At his death, which took place a few days after, two surgeons, of Mere, opened the head of the deceased; and no fracture or any external or internal injury appearing, so as to cause death, the jury returned a verdict, that "the deceased came to his death in a fit of apoplexy."
