North Wraxall (with Upper Wraxall)



NORTH WRAXALL is a parish and village, including the hamlet of Upper Wraxall, in the Northern division of the county, hundred union, and county court district of Chippenham, diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, archdeaconry of Bristol, and rural deanery of Malmesbury South, 7 miles west from Chippenham, 9 north-east from Bath, and 101 from London. The church of St. James is an ancient structure, consisting of nave and chancel, with a tower and 1 bell. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £391, with 87 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Oriel College, Oxford, and held by the Rev. Francis Harrison, M.A. of that college, Oxford. Lord Methuen is the lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Lord Methuen, Mr. Isaac Holborow, and Mrs. B. Holborow. The soil is corn brash; subsoil, rock. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 2,127 acres, and the population in 1861 was 466.

UPPER WRAXALL, is distant one mile west from North Wraxall.

FORD is in this parish: there is a post office here: it is 2 miles east of Wraxall, on the high road to Chippenham.
